CITY OF POCATELLO, IDAHO CITY COUNCIL CITY COUNCIL WORK SESSION MARCH 13, 2025

AGENDA ITEM NO. 1: ROLL CALL

Mayor Brian Blad called the City Council Work Session to order at 9:01 a.m. Council members present were Linda Leeuwrik, Josh Mansfield, Brent Nichols and Hayden Paulsen. Council members Rick Cheatum and Corey Mangum were excused.

AGENDA ITEM NO: 2: AMERICAN FALLS FFA AG ISSUES TEAM PRESENTATION:

Marc Beitia, American Falls High School Future Farmers of America (FFA) Ag Issues Advisor, introduced members of the FFA team.

Representatives from the American Falls FFA Ag Issues Team were present to give a presentation on the pros and cons of highly-processed foods on human health.

Mayor Blad and Council members thanked the students for the presentation and congratulated FFA advisor, Marc Beitia, on his Eastern Idaho Ag Hall of Fame nomination.

AGENDA ITEM NO. 3: ANIMAL SHELTER ADVISORY BOARD UPDATE:

Representatives from the Animal Shelter Advisory Board were in attendance to discuss the Board's goals and projects, as well as Council's policies and expectations.

Arlen Walker, Animal Shelter Advisory Board representative, and Chris Abbott, Animal Shelter Manager, gave an update to the Council on the Board's activities.

Mr. Abbott stated that Animal Control officers have been reorganized under the Police Department Code Enforcement division. The Animal Shelter Advisory Board focuses on shelter and animal care-related issues. Mr. Abbott added that the Board meets on a quarterly basis.

Mr. Walker highlighted that the Board is researching the feasibility of a local spay/neuter ordinance to reduce the number of stray animals. Enforcement of such an ordinance has proven to be challenging in other communities. He reported that discussion has been held regarding increasing licensing fees for unaltered pets to encourage owners to spay and neuter their animals.

Mr. Abbott reported that a spay/neuter voucher program is being developed to help reduce unwanted litters and support responsible pet ownership.

Mr. Walker added that area non-profit animal groups offer discount vouchers to help reduce the spay/neuter cost burdens to pet owners. The vouchers offer reduced rates with no income requirement for participation.

In response to questions from Council, Mr. Abbott stated that the shelter has experienced an increased number of pet surrenders due to the rising cost of veterinary services, food and housing costs. He added that many rentals do not allow pets, contributing to shelter intake. The Trap-Neuter-Release (TNR) Program treats and releases feral cats and sees an average of 10–15 cats per month.

AGENDA ITEM NO. 4: CHILD CARE ADVISORY COMMITTEE UPDATE:

Representatives from the Child Care Advisory Committee were in attendance to discuss the Committee's goals and projects, as well as Council's policies and expectations.

Mallarie Bascom, Licensing Enforcement Officer, introduced Kristin Wurzel and Leah Hollo, Child Care Advisory Committee members. Ms. Bascom gave an overview of local childcare issues, the impact of state legislation (HB243) upon local childcare facilities and the ongoing struggle to hire and maintain staff members. She shared results from a survey sent to local childcare providers.

Kristin Wurzel, representing United Way of Southeast Idaho, emphasized the need for collaborative efforts to invest in childcare and necessary policies that support childcare providers.

Leah Hollo, local childcare business owner, shared the ongoing burden on childcare providers and advocated for funding and policy support to reflect their essential role in raising future generations.

Council members expressed strong support for childcare providers and encouraged public involvement and communication with state legislators regarding House Bill 243, as the bill limits local control over childcare licensing and may lower safety and regulatory standards.

Mayor Blad called a recess at 10:13 a.m.

Mayor Blad reconvened the meeting at 10:24 a.m.

AGENDA ITEM NO. 5: FLOQAST SOFTWARE DEMONSTRATION – FINANCE DEPARTMENT:

Finance Department staff and representatives from FloQast were in attendance to give a demonstration on financial software that integrates with current financial software to provide automated reconciliation, closing tools and workflows to enhance efficiency and accuracy.

Theron Hill, Financial Systems Technician, introduced Albert Olivara and Alec Barzo, representing FloQast. Mr. Hill stated that reconciliation automation exploration was due to increased manual workload and recent staff turnover. He reported Finance Department staff members currently perform daily reconciliations manually, comparing banking data with financial records. The method is time-consuming and can be prone to errors.



Mr. Olivara presented a demonstration of a financial software solution designed to automate reconciliation and streamline financial closing processes. The presentation emphasized integration with existing financial systems and the goal of improving efficiency, accuracy and data handling through automation through the use of Artificial Intelligence (AI) tools. He highlighted AI-driven reconciliation through a video demonstration. He noted the software identifies patterns across datasets to match transactions using an AI engine and establishes reconciliation rules.

Council members discussed the following topics: contractual obligations; data handling; data consistency; compatibility with existing and upcoming financial systems; implementation timeline; and internal AI policy.

Council members expressed interest in the technology and emphasized the need for an Al policy before moving forward.

Mayor Blad announced that staff would work with the Legal Department and Information Technology to develop a comprehensive AI policy applicable to City departments. He emphasized that an AI policy must be in place prior to further Council consideration of Floqast or other AI products for use by the City.

AGENDA ITEM NO. 6: OPTIMIST SKATE PARK DESIGN UPDATE – PARKS AND RECREATION:

Parks and Recreation staff members were present to update the Mayor and Council on the finalized skate park design at Optimist Park.

Anne Butler, Parks and Recreation Department Director, provided an update on the final design for the Optimist Skate Park, a \$500,000 project funded through American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds and community donations. She highlighted that project development included significant public engagement and community feedback. Local experts, the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board and the Southeast Idaho Skatepark Association provided valuable project insight. Ms. Butler stated the final design incorporates key community-requested elements. Addition of an Idaho feature, secondary access and stairs were made possible through a commemorative donation from the Southeast Idaho Skatepark Association. A groundbreaking ceremony is scheduled to take place on March 21, 2025 and construction is expected to take approximately 90 days, weather permitting. Ms. Butler added that a donation request related to the project will be considered by the City Council on March 20, 2025. In response to a question from Council, Ms. Butler stated that an address will be assigned to the skate park to support emergency response coordination.

AGENDA ITEM NO. 7: CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PLAN REQUEST FOR PROPOSAL – FINANCE DEPARTMENT AND PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT SERVICES DEPARTMENT:

Finance Department and Planning and Development Services Department staff members were present to discuss potential procurement of a City-wide Capital Improvement Plan. Representatives included Becky Babb, Planning Manager, Christine Howe, Grants Manager and Gene Hill, Chief Financial Officer.



Ms. Howe introduced a proposal for a comprehensive Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) to align with the City's recently completed Comprehensive Plan 2040. The CIP would facilitate the identification and prioritization of capital projects, integrating potential revenue sources, such as grants.

Mr. Hill emphasized that a structured CIP could enhance the City's financial planning by increasing interest income when funds are allocated to specific projects. He highlighted the strategic approach aims to improve budgeting processes and prepare for future economic downturns.

Ms. Babb noted that while individual departments currently maintain their own capital plans, consolidating these into a City-wide CIP could provide a comprehensive overview, aiding in better resource allocation and identification of potential funding mechanisms.

Ms. Howe clarified that the proposed CIP would cover a 5- to 10-year outlook, allowing the City to plan for anticipated projects and associated costs. She proposed that staff develop a Request for Proposal (RFP) to engage a consultant for the creation of the CIP. Staff could proceed with drafting the RFP, considering the inclusion of deferred maintenance costs and other relevant factors in order to align with the development of the Fiscal Year 2027 budget.

Council members directed staff to move forward with the RFP process for procuring services related to the development of a Capital Improvement Plan.

AGENDA ITEM NO. 8: POCATELLO HISTORIC PRESERVATION PLAN UPDATE:

Planning and Development Services staff and consultant, Kirk Huffaker, were in attendance to receive feedback from the Council regarding a draft of the updated Pocatello Historic Preservation Plan.

Jim Anglesey, Long Range Senior Planner and Historic Preservation Commission (HPC) staff liaison, introduced consultant, Kirk Huffaker and outlined the project schedule, vision statement and primary goals of the Historic Preservation Plan. Primary goals of the Plan include the following:

- 1) Survey and Designation conduct surveys to identify and designate historic resources, including archaeological sites, such as Basalt Cliffs;
- 2) Public Education and Partnerships enhance public education, recognize preservation efforts, collaborate with Idaho State University (ISU) and Shoshone–Bannock Tribes, and provide public programs to increase awareness of Pocatello's heritage and value of historic preservation;
- 3) Policy and Incentives support the City's implementation of SmartCode, establish land acknowledgement and enforce preservation regulations within the historic districts while promoting and utilizing existing historic preservation incentives, and support transformative projects to contribute to the economy; and
- 4) Training and Operations provide regular training for HPC members, building and enforcement officials, review historic district design standards regularly and raise funds to support the work of the HPC.



Mr. Huffaker emphasized that participation in the National Historic Preservation Program does not impose additional local regulatory restrictions, but instead creates opportunities for preservation incentives and recognition. He stated the draft plan aims to balance ambition with realistic implementation, acknowledging staff and volunteer resource limitations while still offering a comprehensive 10-year outlook.

Mr. Anglesey clarified that the plan has been reviewed by City staff, the Idaho State Historic Preservation Office, the Historic Preservation Commission (HPC) and is currently available for public review and comment prior to formal adoption by the City Council at a future Regular City Council meeting.

AGENDA ITEM NO. 9: POCATELLO NOMINATION AS AN AMERICAN WWII HERITAGE CITY:

Planning and Development Services Staff were in attendance to propose that the City submit a nomination to the National Park Service for Pocatello to become an American WWII Heritage City.

Jim Anglesey, Long Range Senior Planner, presented a proposal for the City of Pocatello to submit a nomination to the National Park Service to become designated as an American WWII Heritage City. The designation is an honorary recognition awarded to communities that made significant contributions to the World War II effort. Mr. Anglesey reported that only one city per state may receive this designation. He noted that Pocatello's historical contributions make it a strong candidate, referencing the city's active role in WWII, and the city's historical military connections. Mr. Anglesey added that ongoing community events honoring veterans, such as the Veterans Day Parade and Pearl Harbor recognitions, are significant to the designation. He reported that if the Council is supportive of the proposal, a nomination package would include a letter of support signed by the Mayor, photographs and documentation supporting Pocatello's contributions and letters of endorsement from Congressional representatives Senator Mike Crapo and Representative Mike Simpson. Mr. Anglesey clarified that formal consideration for the nomination would be brought to Council for consideration at the April 17, 2025 Regular City Council meeting.

(c) HISTORIC PRESERVATION COMMISSION APPOINTMENT

Confirm the Mayor's appointment of Darrell Buffaloe to serve as a member of the Historic Preservation Commission, replacing Tabatha Butler whose term expired. Darrell's term will begin March 21, 2025 and expire March 21, 2028.

(d) HOUSING ALLIANCE AND COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS REAPPOINTMENT

Confirm the Mayor's reappointment of Raina Patterson to continue serving as a member of the Housing Alliance and Community Partnerships Board. Raina's term will begin April 23, 2025 and expire April 23, 2030.

(e) COUNCIL DECISION - BARTON VILLAS SUBDIVISION APPROVAL

Adopt the Council's decision approving the subdivision of approximately 1.10 acres of land into thirteen (13) lots and two (2) stormwater/non-buildable lots, generally located in the 800 Block of Barton Road, subject to conditions.

(f) COUNCIL DECISION - WESTERN SKIES DIVISION 4 SUBDIVISION APPROVAL

Mr. Cheatum requested that Agenda Item No. 3(a) be considered separately, as he was not present at the Council meetings on March 6 and March 13, 2025 and therefore, does not feel comfortable voting upon the minutes.

A motion was made by Ms. Leeuwrik, seconded by Mr. Mansfield, to approve items 3(b) through 3(g) on the Consent Agenda. Upon roll call, those voting in favor were Leeuwrik, Mansfield, Cheatum, Mangum, Nichols, and Paulsen.

A motion was made by Ms. Leeuwrik, seconded by Mr. Paulsen, to approve Agenda Item 3(a) on the Consent Agenda. Upon roll call, those voting in favor were Leeuwrik, Paulsen, Mansfield, and Nichols. Cheatum and Mangum voted in opposition to the motion. The motion passed.

AGENDA ITEM NO. 4: PROCLAMATIONS

Mr. Paulsen, on behalf of Mayor Blad, proclaimed the month of March 2025 to be the National Senior Nutrition Program Month in Pocatello and encouraged every resident to recognize older adults and the people who support them through nutrition services as essential contributors to the strength of our community.

Tara Contreras, Senior Activity Center Director, accepted the proclamation and thanked the Mayor and Council for the recognition. She invited Council members to attend lunches at the Senior Activity Center.

AGENDA ITEM NO. 5: CALENDAR REVIEW

Mayor Blad reminded Council members of the following meetings: April 3rd Clarification meeting at 5:30 p.m. and Regular City Council meeting at 6:00 p.m.; April 10th City Council Work Session at 9:00 a.m.

Mayor Blad announced the Groundbreaking Ceremony for the new skate park at Optimist Park on March 21 at 12:00 p.m.; Annual Spring Clean Up at City cemeteries begins March 31. Crews will remove and discard all flowers and decorations. Citizens are asked to remove decorations, etc. they have placed on a cemetery space if they wish to avoid disposal of the item by staff. Clean up is expected to continue through the end of April; Compost Happens Program will run from April 1 through the last full week of November. Yard waste carts will be picked up the same day as your regular collection day; Starting April 5, Zoo Idaho will open weekends only. Beginning May 3, the Zoo will be open every day. Sandbags are available to residents at the Public Works building located



at 2405 Garrett Way. He reminded citizens to keep sidewalks clear of snow and ice. When clearing sidewalks and driveways of snow, please do not place snow in the street. It becomes a driving hazard.

AGENDA ITEM NO. 6: TAXICAB LICENSE DENIAL APPEAL - JOHNSON

Ronald Johnson was present to appeal his taxicab license denial, which was denied by the Pocatello Police Department.

Ronald Johnson, Pocatello resident, stated that he has appealed the denial of his taxi cab license, and explained past charges and subsequent convictions. He shared personal experiences that he felt led to behaviors and actions that are now on his criminal record including fraudulently obtaining prescription drugs, and other convictions.

In response to questions from Council, Mr. Johnson explained his previous drug use, sobriety, and rehabilitation programs in which he has participated. He stated that he is retired.

Mallarie Bascom, Licensing Enforcement Officer, explained that Mr. Johnson's taxi license application was denied in accordance with City code 5.56.050e which states that applicants must possess a criminal record free from conviction for any felony or for crimes involving moral turpitude or violence or possession or sale of any controlled substances. Upon examining Mr. Johnson's criminal record, she found multiple disqualifying charges, including several felony convictions for theft, drug offenses, and criminal impersonation of law enforcement officers. Some charges had been dismissed. Mr. Johnson had a long history of providing false information, including using multiple dates of birth and social security numbers. Mr. Johnson was convicted in 2008, 2011–2013, 2015, 2017, and 2021. Ms. Bascom noted that Mr. Johnson's application only mentioned his most recent conviction in 2021, omitting several other charges. She clarified that she was still awaiting reports from other jurisdictions, but the FBI fingerprint search covered all relevant data. She confirmed that while there were no outstanding charges, the reports provided sufficient background to deny Mr. Johnson's application.

Council expressed support for second chances but were uncomfortable with the repeated offenses of impersonating officers, especially in a role like driving a taxi. Council emphasized the need to prioritize public safety.

A motion was made by Mr. Mangum, seconded by Mr. Mansfield, to uphold the decision of the Police Department and deny the taxicab license for Ronald Johnson. Upon roll call, those voting in favor were Mangum, Mansfield, Cheatum, Leeuwrik, Nichols, and Paulsen.

AGENDA ITEM NO. 7: FISCAL YEAR 2025 PROGRAM OF PROJECTS – PUBLIC TRANSIT

Council was asked to approve the 2025 Operating and Capital Program of Projects for Public Transit's Urban and Rural services and authorize the Mayor and City Attorney to PIN the Grant Certifications (5307) and authorize the Public Transit Director to make necessary amendments and modifications related to the grants as required, subject to Legal Department review for the following:



- (a) FEDERAL TRANSIT ADMINISTRATION URBAN GRANT (5307)
 Federal Transit Administration Urban Grant (5307) in the amount of \$1,445,534.00 for Fiscal Year 2025 with a local share of \$848,884.00; and
- (b) FEDERAL TRANSIT ADMINISTRATION RURAL GRANT (5311)
 Federal Transit Administration Rural Idaho Transportation Department
 Grant (5311) in the amount of \$791,395.00 for Fiscal Year 2025 with a local share of \$347,893.00. No City funds are used for the Rural Program.

A motion was made by Ms. Leeuwrik, seconded by Mr. Paulsen, to approve the 2025 Operating and Capital Program of Projects for Public Transit's Urban and Rural services as outlined in Agenda Item No. 7(a) and 7(b) and authorize the Mayor and City Attorney to PIN the Grant Certifications (5307) and authorize the Public Transit Director to make necessary amendments and modifications related to the grants as required, subject to Legal Department review. Upon roll call, those voting in favor Leeuwrik, Paulsen, Cheatum, Mangum, Mansfield, and Nichols.

AGENDA ITEM NO. 8: DONATION ACCEPTANCE - SOUTHEAST IDAHO SKATEPARK ASSOCIATION

Council was asked to accept a donation in the amount of \$25,000.00 from the Southeast Idaho Skatepark Association, and apply those funds to add a feature to the quarter pipe, a stair set and additional entrance to the new Optimist Skatepark.

A motion was made by Mr. Mangum, seconded by Ms. Leeuwrik, to accept a donation in the amount of \$25,000.00 from the Southeast Idaho Skatepark Association, and apply those funds to add a feature to the quarter pipe, a stair set and additional entrance to the new Optimist Skatepark.

Dave Van Etten, accompanied by Tatyana Van Etten, representing Southeast Idaho Skate Park Association, thanked the Council for their support of the youth in the community, expressing excitement about the new project and its anticipated year-round use by many. Mr. Van Etten expressed excited anticipation for the upcoming groundbreaking ceremony and appreciation for the hard work of those in the skate park community.

Council expressed their appreciation to the Southeast Idaho Skate Park Association.

Upon roll call, those voting in favor were Mangum, Leeuwrik, Cheatum, Mansfield, Nichols, and Paulsen.

AGENDA ITEM NO. 9: WPC LIFT STATION PUMP PURCHASE - MCKINLEY LIFT STATION

Spencer, LLC to replace the existing pump at the McKinley Lift Station. The quoted cost of the equipment if \$64,725.39. Funds are available in the FY2025 WPC budget for this expenditure.

Funds are available in the Water Department Fiscal Year 2025 budget.

A motion was made by Mr. Mansfield, seconded by Mr. Cheatum, to accept the recommendations of staff and award the bid for High Country Tank Replacement Project to MD Nursery and Landscaping, Inc. in the amount of \$3,955,852.00 and authorize the Mayor's signature on all applicable documents, subject to Legal Department review.

Justin Armstrong, Water Superintendent, stated that the project contract allows 395 days for completion, including weather delays. Construction is expected to begin this summer, with earthwork starting once the notice of award is issued and insurance documents are finalized. He explained the tank subcontractor is anticipated to begin work this fall, weather permitting.

AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT, made and dated this __th day of April, 2025 by and between the City of Pocatello, Bannock County, Idaho, a municipal corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of Idaho, hereinafter referred to as the "City", whose mailing address is the City of Pocatello, 911 North 7th Street, P.O. Box 4169, Pocatello, Idaho 83205-4169, and Historic Downtown Pocatello, Inc., a non-profit corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of Idaho, whose mailing address is 435 W. Center St., P.O. Box 222, Pocatello, Idaho 83204-0222, hereinafter referred to as the "Corporation."

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the City, pursuant to Ordinance No. 2390 as authorized by Idaho Code 50-2601, et seq, did establish a Business Improvement District, hereinafter referred to as the "BID"; and

WHEREAS, the City desires that an entity other than the City continue to administer and manage the operation of the BID; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Idaho Code 50-2611 a City may contract with a Chamber of Commerce or other similar business association to administer the operations of a BID; and

WHEREAS, the Corporation was organized and established for the purpose of revitalizing Pocatello's downtown area and operates within the boundaries of the BID established by Ordinance No. 2390; and

WHEREAS, the Corporation has demonstrated to the City that the Corporation is capable of administering and managing the operation of the BID;

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the covenants and conditions set forth herein, the parties agree as follows:

- 1. The parties agree, pursuant to Idaho Code 50-2611, that the Corporation is designated by the City to administer and manage the operation of the BID. The Corporation warrants that it has adopted by-laws necessary to fulfill the terms of this agreement and further covenants that such administration complies with all applicable provisions of state and local law including, but not limited to, Chapter 26, Title 50 of the Idaho Code, with all county or city resolutions and ordinances, and with all regulations lawfully imposed by the state auditor or other state agencies.
- 2. The principal office of the Corporation and registered agent shall be the Historic Downtown Pocatello, Inc., President, 435 W. Center St., P.O. Box 222, Pocatello, Idaho 83204-0222, or as otherwise designated by the Corporation's Board of Directors and approved by the City.
- 3. The Corporation shall continue to take such steps as are necessary to effectuate the purpose of the BID Ordinance No. 2390.

- 4. The Corporation shall project revenues and estimate expenditures for review by the City Council based on a January 1 through December 31, 2025 calendar year. The budget shall be submitted to the City no later than the 1st day of April each year for review and adoption by the City Council.
- 5. The Corporation's Directors shall hold an annual meeting of BID members the purposes of which shall include allowing members of the BID to review the annual budget. Subsequent to such review, any amendments, alterations or adjustments made to the annual budget which results in an increase or decrease to the total annual budget shall be submitted within thirty (30) days to the City for City Council approval.
- 6. An assessment-paying member of the BID may petition the Corporation's Board of Directors in writing for a review/appeal of his/her assessment. The Board of Directors shall review the method utilized in determining the assessments and the Board shall make corrections in the event an error has occurred, which correction may cause an increase or decrease in the assessment in accordance with Ordinance No. 2390. Applicants may appeal the decision of the Board of Directors to the Mayor and City Council within thirty (30) days of the date of the decision.
- 7. The Corporation shall establish goals and objectives, and projects and programs for the BID, which shall be submitted to the City with the budgetary information.
- 8. The calendar year of the Corporation shall be on the 1st day of January and end at midnight on the last day of December.
- 9. The Corporation shall keep correct and complete books and records of account, and shall also keep minutes of the regular and special meetings of the Corporation's Board of Directors, and shall keep at the principal office a record giving the name and address of the BID members entitled to vote.
- 10. The City or its agents may inspect all books and records of the Corporation for any proper purpose at any reasonable time.
- 11. The City shall make monthly disbursements to the Corporation in the amount of assessments collected and held by the City, less expenses incurred by the City to bill and collect such assessments. The Corporation shall establish and adhere to finance policies which set forth the proper methods and controls applying to receipt and disbursement of BID funds. The Corporation shall, on a quarterly basis, submit financial statements to the City which show the change in cash position. Such quarterly statements shall consist of at minimum, the Corporation's Balance Sheet and Income Statement. The Corporation shall also submit an annual financial statement to the City for the immediate past fiscal year by the last day of March of each year.
- 12. All expenditures of the Corporation greater than five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) or any purchases of real property must be submitted to the City Council for review and approval prior to any such expenditure or purchase of real property being transacted.

- 13. The Corporation shall follow the appropriate guidelines regarding local government investments as set forth in Idaho Code 50-1013 as it applies to the investment of BID funds.
- 14. The Corporation may hire staff upon review and approval of the City Council in accordance with the annual budget who shall be employees of the Corporation rather than the City.
- 15. The City shall be responsible for billing and accounting for assessments; however, the City shall not be responsible for any financial obligations incurred by the Corporation.
- 16. The Corporation agrees that it shall make all reasonable efforts to collect any unpaid assessments, including but not limited to court enforced assessments. All assessments collected shall immediately be forwarded to the City. The City agrees to reasonably assist the Corporation in performance of such duties.
- 17. Any expenditures for physical improvements to public properties shall be made in accordance with competitive bidding practices as required by law.
- 18. The Corporation may establish marketing and advertising campaigns for the BID.
- 19. The Corporation may declare special event days for the BID in accordance with City Council policy and city ordinances.
- 20. This Agreement shall be reviewed and renewed on annual basis in the month of March of each year so as to coincide with the Corporation's calendar year. The Agreement may be terminated upon sixty (60) days written notice to either party at the address hereinabove set forth.

IN WITNESS THEREOF, the Mayor and the City Clerk of the City of Pocatello have executed this Agreement on behalf of said city, the City Clerk has affixed the seal of the city hereto, and corporation has caused the same to be signed by its President and Secretary, and its seal to be affixed hereto, the day and year first above written.

EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT

This Employment Agreement, by and between HISTORIC DOWNTOWN POCATELLO, INC., an Idaho not-for-profit organization, P.O. Box 222, 435 W. Center St., Pocatello, Idaho 83204, hereinafter referred to as "Employer", and Stephanie Palagi, 975 Homerun St., Chubbuck, ID 83202, hereinafter referred to as "Employee".

WHEREAS, Employer is engaged in the business of revitalization and promotion of downtown Pocatello.

AND, WHEREAS, Employer desires to employee as President and CEO, of Historic Downtown Pocatello, Inc., an exempt job under the Fair Labor Standards Act,

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties hereto agree as follows:

- 1. Employment. Employer hereby employs Employee and Employee hereby accepts such employment upon the terms and conditions herein set forth.
- 2. Term. The term of this Agreement shall be for the period beginning on January 1 and continuing until the 31st day of December, 2025, unless sooner terminated as herein provided.
- 3. Termination. This Agreement may be sooner terminated without liability by either party with or without cause upon thirty (30) days written notice. Provided that in the case of termination by Employer, such shall be formal action at a duly called meeting or resolution by the Employers' Board of Directors clearly adopted by a majority of all members of the Employers' Board of Directors. In lieu of thirty (30) days written notice, the Employers' Board of Directors may immediately release Employee by tendering one-month's salary and benefits and waiving in writing further performance by Employee. Employee may be immediately terminated for a material breach of this Agreement, negligent or willful disregard for the Employer when carrying out her job duties and obligations or for dishonest, fraudulent or criminal conduct on the part of the Employee. This Agreement shall immediately terminate upon the death of the Employee.
- 4. Compensation. For the service rendered under this Agreement, compensation shall be paid to Employee as follows:
 - 4.1 Salary. During the term of this Agreement, Employee shall be paid a salary in the amount of \$3,733.34 per month based on a 40-hour work week beginning the 1st day of January 2025. Salary payments shall be subject to usual withholding of such items as taxes and insurance. The amount shall be divided in equal installments in accordance with Employer's payroll procedures.
 - 4.2 Expenses. Employee shall receive monthly reimbursement for expenses, including but not limited to phone expenses, mileage and club dues. Expenses may be submitted for reimbursement at the Employer's Board's sole discretion, which approval shall not establish future policy unless specifically so provided by the Employer's Board.
 - 4.3 Employer's Board of Directors may award additional compensation based on Employee's performance and overall financial performance of the organization.
- 5. Duties. Employee shall perform all duties charged to that position by federal, state, and local laws and regulations as established by the Employer's Board of Directors and shall carry out the policy determined in the Employees job description.
- 6. Personal Time Off. Employee shall be eligible for 25 paid personal days off. Personal time off includes any time taken for vacation, personal business, and illness. Employee shall provide advanced notice and use personal time off at such time convenient to the operations of Historic Downtown Pocatello, Inc., and without necessitating additional staff cost. Any unused personal time remaining at the end of this Agreement shall be paid at the end of the calendar year. Any unused personal time will be paid upon early termination of the Employment Agreement.
- 7. Holidays. Employee shall be entitled to the following paid holidays:

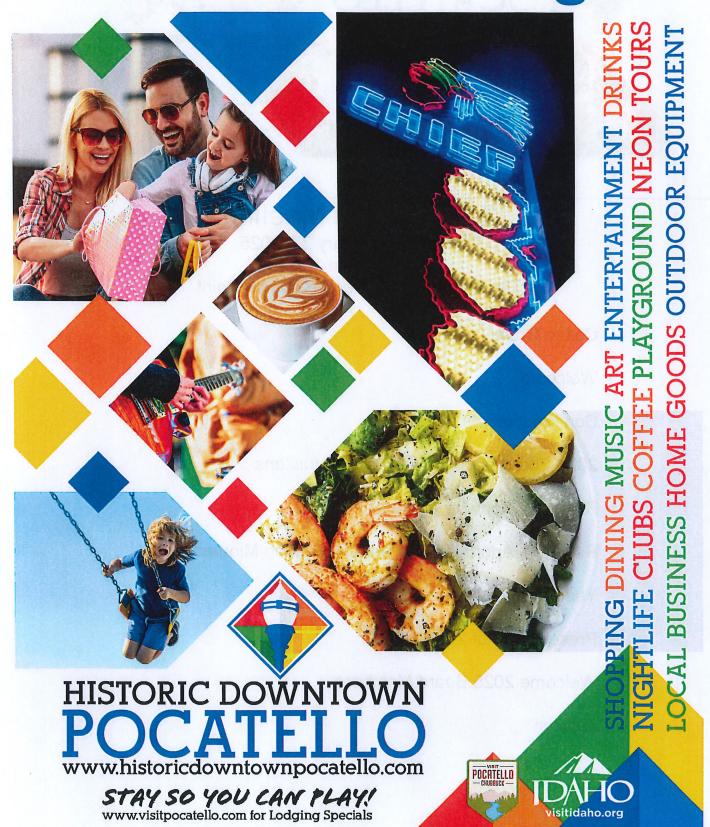

- 8. Performance Evaluation. The Employee performance evaluation will be conducted annually under the direction of the Chairperson of the Personnel Committee. The content of the performance evaluation shall be determined by the Job Description and approved by the Personnel Committee.
- 9. Waiver of Breach. The waiver of any party hereto of a breach of any provision of this Agreement shall not operate or be construed as a waiver of any subsequent breach by any party.
- 10. Notices. Any notice required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be sufficient if in writing, sent by mail to her residence in the case the Employee or to its principal office and President of the Employer's Board of Directors if in the case of the Employer.
- 11. Governing Law. This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Idaho.
- 12. Arbitration. In the case of an irresolvable conflict between the parties hereto related to this Agreement or Employee's employment, both parties agree to submit the issue to binding arbitration through and pursuant to the rules of the American Arbitration Association. Such arbitration shall occur in Pocatello, Idaho and shall be a condition precedent to any judicial action by either party, except an action to compel arbitration. If the issue between the parties relates to Employer's termination of Employee, Employee shall remain terminated without pay pending arbitration or arbitration proceedings.

SUBJECT: Proposed Fiscal Year 2025 Sanitation Fee Amendment and Resolution

The Sanitation Services Department has evaluated current recycling services in an effort to meet the City Council's goal of creating a Commercial Cardboard Program. The evaluation has determined there is an increased need and demand for recycling services within the community. In order to meet the need and demand for these services, it will require Sanitation Services to redefine and add to their current recycling program. With the changes, it requires modifications and additions to the current FY2025 service fees. Therefore, Council may wish to accept the recommendation of staff for the amendments to the fees and approve the proposed mid-year fee changes amending Exhibit S, Sanitation Department Fees, of the City's Fee Schedule for Sanitation Services for Fiscal Year 2025.

A Resolution has been prepared, and Council may wish to authorize Mayor Blad to sign and execute the paperwork necessary to effectuate the new fee schedule.

WHEREAS, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 2024-30 on August 15, 2024 for the fees charged for City Departments and Services for the Fiscal Year 2025; and

WHEREAS, the Sanitation Department wishes to expand their recycling services which require service fees, and made recommendations to the City Council for the amendment and addition of said fees for Fiscal Year 2025; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing was held on April 17, 2025, pursuant to Idaho Code § 63-1311A, where the City Council considered input provided by the public; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has determined that said recommended fees be amended and added for Fiscal Year 2025.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF POCATELLO AS FOLLOWS:

1. That fees for City provided services for Fiscal Year 2025 shall be adopted and charged as they are more specifically delineated in Exhibit S, which is attached to this Resolution and incorporated herein.

2. That all other Exhibits of Resolution No. 2024-30 not herein amended shall remain in full force and effect.

3. That the fees provided for in Exhibit S shall be effective May 1, 2025, through September 30, 2025.

EXHIBIT S SANITATION DEPARTMENT FEES

- 1. Pocatello Municipal Code § 13.28.230 authorizes the annual setting of fees for the municipal refuse collection service by Resolution of the City Council.
- 2. The City Council retained the engineering firm of Raftelis Financial Consulting, Inc. to conduct a rate study to project revenues and costs for 2025 to 2029 and to recommend necessary refuse collection services rates thereafter.
- 3. Inasmuch as sanitation services are mandatory, there shall be a minimum monthly charge of \$22.28 for sanitation services for any premises within the City, even if collection services are refused or not requested. Recycling services are a voluntary option.
- 4. Persons who qualify for Bannock County's Circuit Breaker Exemption List and meet the following requirements, shall receive a 30% reduction on that portion of their utility bill listed as "Refuse Collection" for one cart/one pickup. Said reduction shall be available only to those who own and occupy a single-family dwelling and shall not be available for multi-family units, including duplexes. Upon receipt of the Circuit Breaker Exemption List from Bannock County, the City Utility Billing Department shall make the reduction, which shall remain in effect so long as the applicant meets the requirements set forth herein. Circuit Breaker discount applies only to the first residential cart; additional services are not discounted.
- 5. Fees for regular collection service are charged on a monthly basis, unless otherwise noted.

APPLICANT/OWNER: Johnathan Balls on behalf of Pocatello/Chubbuck School

District 25

LOCATION: 1800 Bench Road

REQUEST: Vacation of 1.59 acres (more or less) of Bench Road

RECOMMENDATION & CONDITIONS: Based on the information presented in this report, staff recommends approval of vacating the subject Right-Of-Way (ROW), with the following conditions attached:

- 1. The standards and requirements as outlined in the Public Works Memorandum shall be strictly adhered to. This includes retaining a 70-foot wide easement coinciding with existing Right Of Way (ROW) width and defined as a public access and maintenance utility easement;
- 2. The legal description for the subject parcel shall be reviewed and approved by the City Surveyor prior to recording;
- 3. The end of Bench Road which is blocked to vehicular traffic shall remain as such with exception of placing a gate with Knox Box to be used for secondary emergency access only. This is a recommendation of Public Works;
- 4. Per recommendation of Bannock Transportation Planning Organization (BTPO), the area of vacation shall remain open to pedestrian and bicycles as Bench Road is a designated bike route.;
- 5. Parking shall be prohibited adjacent (to the east) of the residences addressed 1794 through 1734 Cheshire Avenue;
- 6. Any other requirements not herein noted above but applicable as part of an approved ROW vacation shall be strictly adhered to.

REQUEST: An application has been submitted by Johnathan Balls on behalf of Pocatello/Chubbuck School District 25, requesting to vacate the public's interest entailing 69,260 square-feet or 1.59-acres (more or less) of the 1800 block of Bench Road extending from the South entrance into Connections Credit Union to the southern - most entrance of Highland High's parking lot (refer to the aerial and the site map for details).

In addition - per Idaho Code §50-1321 the applicant obtained written consent for adjoining property owners abutting Bench Road. Such is provided as part of the City Council agenda packet.

BACKGROUND: The applicant is desirous of vacating the aforementioned Right-Of-Way (ROW) to increase safety for students, staff and patrons of Highland High.

NOTIFICATION: All property owners within a 300-foot radius of the existing property boundaries have been provided notice of the public hearing by mail in order that they may provide comment on the proposed request. Notice was also provided in the legal section of the Idaho State Journal.

UTILITY PROVIDER & CITY DEPARTMENT NOTICE: Utility providers and affected City departments were provided notice on 3/6/2025. Staff received comment from personnel representing Intermountain Gas Company, Sparklight, and Lumen all of which have infrastructure within the area to vacated. This being the case Public Works Staff is requiring that an Access and Utility Easement be maintained across the entire length and width of the area of vacation (refer to Public Works Memorandum)

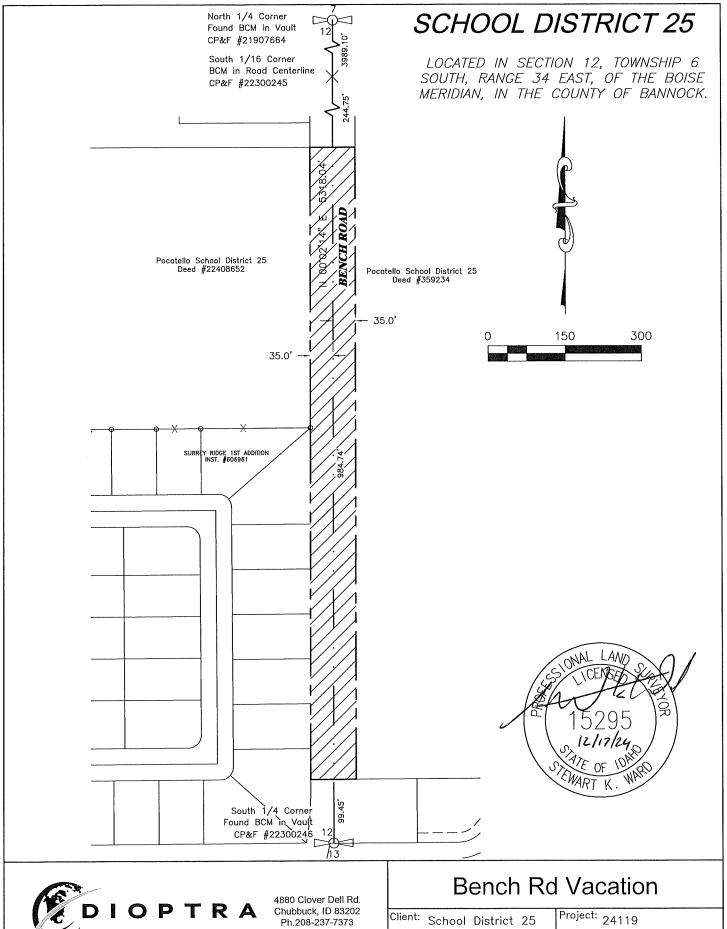

The Public Works Departments have reviewed the right-of-way vacation application request for the above-mentioned project and submits that the following items shall be addressed and approved prior to recording the vacation ordinance. Approval is contingent on the completeness, accuracy, serviceability, and compliance to City Standards.

- 1. Retain and record 70-foot wide easement coinciding of the existing right-of-way width and defined as a public access and utility maintenance easement.
- 2. Retain pedestrian and bicycle access from the adjacent subdivision and through the vacated portion of the right-of-way as recommended by the Bannock Transportation Planning Organization (BTPO).

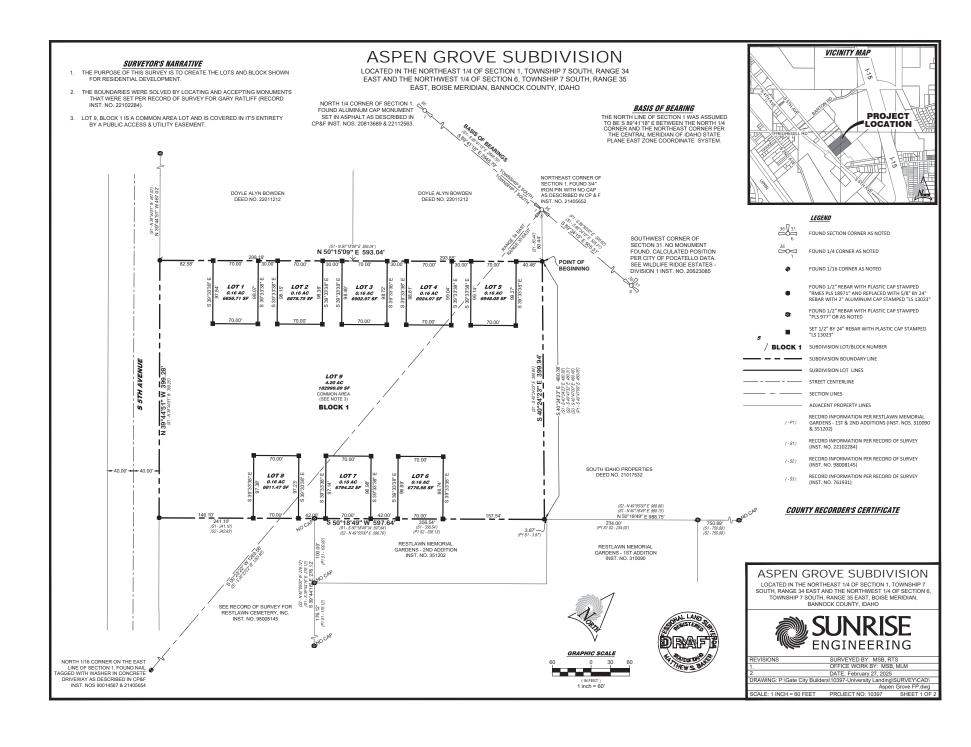

The Public Works Departments have reviewed the final plat/construction drawings application for the above-mentioned project and submits that the following changes and items shall be addressed and approved prior to beginning construction. Approval is contingent on the completeness, accuracy, serviceability, and compliance to City Standards.

1. Plat

- **A.** After approval by the City Council of the proposed final plat, Applicant will be required to enter into a Development Agreement with the City of Pocatello.
- **B.** Prior to recording the Plat, a more inclusive and comprehensive review shall be done, coordinate all plat correction through City Surveyor.
- C. Subdivision plat shall conform to all state and local laws and ordinances.
- **D.** Notes on the plat shall be approved by the City of Pocatello Engineering and Legal Department prior to recording.
- **E.** The City of Pocatello certificate to read: The plat on which this certificate appears is hereby approved and the dedications are hereby accepted by the City of Pocatello...
- **F.** If there are any CCR's, indicate and place recording number on the plat. Submit any CCR's associated with this plat to the City Engineering Department after recording.
- **G.** Provide adjoining property owners recorded deeds, a copy of all recorded easements and document(s) which grants the signatory to sign the plat on the behalf of the owner(s) to the City Surveyor for final review.
- **H.** Signed copy of the Permanent Operations and Maintenance (O&M) agreement for stormwater, if stormwater system is to be private. This document will be recorded.
- **I.** The plat shall be reproducible on an 8.5x11 sheet of paper per Bannock County instructions. The plat shall be black opaque ink, no gray scale or color.



- J. Add note, Easements not depicted: All lots in this subdivision are subject to a drainage easement equal to the primary structure setback line along all lot lines. Lots must be graded and maintained so as to minimize drainage to adjoining properties.
- K. Add note, Easements not depicted: There is an easement for refuse pickup that is within the parking area. Also add this paragraph to the owner's certificate. "The undersigned owner(s) of real property located within the Aspen Grove Subdivision Plat, hereby grant permission to the City of Pocatello Sanitation Department to drive City vehicles onto the asphalt/concrete and any other private property in order to provide garbage service at the above location including vehicles needed to perform clean-up maintenance on such private property. Owner(s) release and hold harmless the City of Pocatello, a municipal corporation of Idaho, and its employees from any liability and will accept full responsibility for damages to the driving surface area, Owner(s) acknowledge and agree are beyond the control of the City of Pocatello and its employees.

2. Construction Plans/Infrastructure

A. Development Conditions

- 1. Gate valve required on main line at tap for isolation and testing.
- 2. Master meter and backflow assembly required for development. Billing will be one account for HOA.
- 3. ITD permit shall be required for work in South 5th right-of-way.
- 4. Each fire line will require an isolation valve in the parking lot, and each service will require a curb stop.
- 5. Add fire hydrant to accommodate 300' hydrant spacing requirement.
- 6. This memo addresses the site improvements for the subdivision only. Building and site plans will be reviewed at time of application for a building permit.

B. General Conditions

- 1. Filing of a notice of intent (NOI) and a formal Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP) in accordance with the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Construction General Permit (CGP) shall be submitted if the project requires, if required then a copy shall be submitted to the City.
- 2. An erosion and sediment control plan and a final stabilization plan will be required as part of the final plat application. An individual who has successfully completed an approved training course and who has demonstrated competence, through education, training, and knowledge of the applicable laws and regulations in erosion and sediment, and is current on certifications shall be required to be the responsible person to oversee the plan (if certified person is unknown indicate that information will be submitted prior



to any work to the site). Submittal shall meet the requirements of the federal construction general permit.

- 6. Pond side slopes and embankments shall be designed and constructed per Section 6.4.6 SETBACKS, SLOPES, EMBANKMENTS & SPILLWAYS of the Portneuf Valley Stormwater Design Manual, embankments 4 feet in height or more shall be constructed as recommended by a Geotechnical Engineer.

The request is to allow for lot size averaging to construct eight (8) multi-family structures on individual lots with Lot 9 proposed to be a common lot for stormwater retention, recreation area and parking.

COMPREHENSIVE PLAN: The Comprehensive Plan Map designates the area for Residential. Staff finds the following goals, objectives and policies from the Comprehensive Plan to be applicable to this application: <u>Housing Goal 1:</u> Encourage development of a wide variety of high-quality housing opportunities that are safe, sanitary, attractive and affordable. <u>Objective 1.1</u>: Encourage development of housing affordable for households of all income levels throughout the community.

NOTIFICATION (16.20.040.D): All property owners within a 300-foot radius of the existing property boundaries have been provided notice of the public hearing in order that they may provide comment on the proposed request. Notice was also published in the <u>Idaho State Journal</u> and a sign was posted on the subject property. No public comment has been received as of the completion of the staff report.

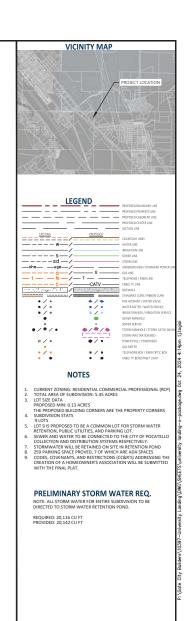

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

The Planning & Development Services Department is requesting ratification of the submission of a grant application for the US Department of Transportation's Rural and Tribal Assistance RTA) Pilot Program. This grant application would provide necessary funding for completion of a municipal services impact analysis from the proposed CREST - Commercial, Retail, Entertainment, Sports, and Travel - development.

The 3200-acre CREST development is proposed to be developed on Pocatello Regional Airport land that currently sits vacant. This development includes commercial, retail, sports, hotels, and other similar industry that will bring in major economic development opportunities for the City and surrounding Power and Bannock counties. However, along with the major new development will come demands on the municipal services provided to the area. This RTA project will be comprised of a municipal services impact analysis to determine future capital buildout required to support the CREST development. Possible municipal infrastructure needs include multifaceted public infrastructure such as public roads, new sewer and water infrastructure, public transit expansion, and public safety facilities to support the proposed development.

The RTA grant would fund project planning and feasibility analysis, an evaluation of costs for the municipal infrastructure, and preliminary engineering plans. Total project costs are estimated to be \$500,000 and would be fully funded by the grant.

The RTA application will be submitted April 17th, 2025 at 3PM MT; therefore, Council may wish to approve ratification of the application submission.

The City of Pocatello's Municipal Services Impact Analysis is a planning, feasibility study, and preliminary engineering project that will address the impact of a large-scale development on municipal services provided by the City of Pocatello. The 3200-acre development called CREST – Commercial, Retail, Entertainment, Sports, and Travel – is proposed to be developed on Pocatello Regional Airport land that currently sits vacant. This development includes commercial, retail, sports, hotels, and other similar industry that will bring in major economic development opportunities for the City and surrounding Power and Bannock counties. However, along with the major new development will come demands on the municipal services provided to the area. This RTA project will be comprised of a municipal services impact analysis to determine future capital buildout required to support the CREST development. Features to be constructed include multifaceted public infrastructure such as public roads, new sewer and water infrastructure, public transit expansion, and public safety facilities to support the proposed development.

The project area includes 3200 acres near Pocatello Regional Airport, along Terminal Way and Frontage Road.

As the CREST development is entering the preliminary design phase and preparing to move forward from a feasibility analysis, there is an immediate need to understand the impacts of the development on municipal services. This RTA project will provide the City with necessary data to understand the potential for financing the capital improvements or the need for special revenue mechanisms such as a TIF district.

The Municipal Services Impact Analysis would begin upon award and be completed in 8 months to align with the proposed schedule for the CREST development.

Activities to be completed with the program funding will include:

- All elements of a development impact analysis including: feasibility analysis and evaluation of costs to complete the municipal infrastructure build-out necessary to support the CREST development;
- Water/sewer demand analysis;
- Public safety demand analysis; and
- Preliminary engineering for the required roadwork, sewer, water, and transit facilities.

By completing this demand analysis and the preliminary engineering for the build-out of municipal infrastructure, the City will have preliminary engineering plans and documents that can inform construction costs for the infrastructure needs. This will allow Pocatello to find revenue sources for the construction phase of this project including potential BUILD grant funding. The CREST development will require an expansion of the noted municipal services and without the improved roads and transit access, it will be challenging to move forward. Additionally, without identifying the impact on sewer and water

infrastructure, decisions regarding the size and type of these additions cannot be made.

Future cost projections to sustain the project (including maintenance and operations costs) will also be included in the development impact analysis. This will provide the City with necessary budget information to ensure future upkeep of the expanded transportation and other municipal facilities. IN particular, the City will be well positioned to expand roadways for the development's transportation needs as well as identify the best locations for Pocatello Regional Transit stops and amenities.

The CREST development has completed a two-phase conceptual plan and is scheduled to complete a feasibility analysis for the development in Summer 2025. The City has reviewed preliminary plans and identified municipal facilities that will need to be analyzed and updated. The City's Water and Sewer infrastructure plans (rate studies) have not accounted for this development and will need to be updated. City staff have completed a review of the conceptual plans for the CREST development and identified major municipal infrastructure needs for the area that will need to be included in the impact analysis. This includes: roadways (access and egress), the highway interchange, traffic flow and traffic management, water infrastructure, sewer infrastructure expansion and demand, transit facilities, and public safety demand. This initial review of the conceptual plans has provided a basis for the RTA scope of work and will be continued to develop the scopes of work for the impact analysis.

Section 9007 (a) of the <u>John D. Dingell Jr. Conservation, Management, and Recreation Act of 2019</u>
(https://www.congress.gov/bill/116th-congress/senate-bill/47/text) allows only one designation per U.S. state or territory.

During the nomination period, any jurisdictions in a state or a territory that meet the <u>criteria</u> can be nominated. A state or territory may have multiple nominations; however, only **one** will be chosen for designation as an American World War II Heritage City. Once a designation has been made, the state or territory is removed from the <u>eligibility list</u>.

Who Can Apply

Any local government jurisdiction located in a U.S. state or territory that doesn't already have an American World War II Heritage City. See the list above for currently eligible states and territories.

Note: An entire state or territory <u>cannot apply for designation</u>. Only a local government jurisdiction within a currently eligible state or territory may be designated.

Local Government Jurisdiction

A local government jurisdiction ("jurisdiction") is a locally managed populated area with a defined political border. It falls under a state or territory government. Jurisdictions include, but aren't limited to, counties, parishes, municipalities, cities, townships, boroughs, towns, and villages.

While the designation is World War II Heritage "City", any jurisdiction in an <u>eligible state or territory</u> that meets the <u>criteria</u> can be nominated for designation.

Examples: Northfield, Vermont (town) a primary producer of wool for the U.S. military; Denver, Colorado (city) which had multiple military sites, defense manufacturing companies.

Nominating Two or More Jurisdictions Together

Two or more jurisdictions can apply together in a *joint* nomination, as long as:

- 1. The jurisdictions are contiguous and/or overlap. *Note:* Joint nominations with either discontiguous jurisdictions or ones that do not overlap will not be accepted.
- 2. The nomination is endorsed by each jurisdiction's highest locally elected official.

Examples: Polk and Benton Counties in Oregon. The counties share a contiguous border and were together the home of Camp Adair. The Camp was a large military training facility that had a great impact on surrounding communities and the home front; the City and County of Honolulu, Hawaii where the initial attack on the US took place.

Criteria for Designation

Applicants must meet both criterion 1 and 2 in order to be considered for designation.

- 1. Contributions by a city and its environs to the World War II home-front war effort, such as contributions related to: *
 - Adaptations to wartime survival
 - Civil defense preparedness
 - o Defense manufacturing, such as ships, aircraft, uniforms, and equipment
 - Production of foodstuffs and consumer items for Armed Forces and home consumption
 - Volunteer participation
 - War bond drives
 - Personnel serving in the Armed Forces, their achievements, and facilities for their rest and recreation, or
 - The presence of Armed Forces camps, bases, airfields, harbors, repair facilities, and other installations within or in its environs.
- 2. Achievements by a city and its environs to preserve the heritage and legacy of the city's contributions to the war effort and to preserve World War II history, such as contributions related to: *
 - o Establishment of memorials to area men who lost their lives in service
 - Establishment of museums, parks, and markers
 - o Organizing groups of veterans and home-front workers and their recognition
 - o Presentation of cultural events such as dances, plays, and lectures
 - The identification, preservation, restoration, and interpretation of World War II-related structures, facilities, and sites
 - o Public relations outreach through the print and electronic media, and books, and
 - Recognition and ceremonies remembering wartime event anniversaries

* Does my jurisdiction have to meet each of the subcategories under criterions 1 and 2?

<u>No</u>

The subcategories are not a list of requirements. Jurisdictions are required to have activities under both criterion 1 and 2, but they don't have to meet each subcategory. The subcategories are intended to be examples of specific home front and commemoration topics (https://irma.nps.gov/DataStore/Reference/Profile/2299458). These topics can be used to help describe jurisdictions' qualifications for designation as American World War II Heritage Cities.

There are no requirements for jurisdictions to have specific numbers of activities or subcategories. However, when nominating jurisdictions it's best to briefly describe activities under as many subcategories as possible that are significant to the location. This can help support jurisdictions' qualifications for designation.

Activities that don't fall under a Subcategory

Jurisdictions can also include WWII home front history and commemoration activities in their nominations that aren't specifically listed as subcategories, but that still apply under criterions 1 and 2.

How to Apply

The process begins when:

The highest locally elected official in a jurisdiction submits a nomination for their community to the National Park Service's American World War II Heritage Cities Program.

Two or more jurisdictions nominating together will submit one joint nomination.

A nomination must include:

A cover letter addressed to the <u>National Park Service</u>
 <u>Director (https://www.nps.gov/aboutus/director.htm)</u> and
 signed by the jurisdiction's highest locally elected official.
 For multiple jurisdiction nominations the cover letter(s)
 must be signed by each jurisdiction's highest locally elected
 official.

A brief descriptions of how the jurisdiction meets criterions 1 and 2 in the <u>Criteria for Designation</u> (see above).

A nomination can also include other optional materials such as:

- Endorsements from each jurisdiction's members of Congress, delegate(s), or resident commissioner (strongly recommended).
- A map showing that home front and commemorative activities occurred within the jurisdiction's boundaries (*strongly* recommended). Any format, such as pins on a Google map or a hand-drawn markup on a print map, is acceptable.
- Photographs and historic images of commemorative events and activities saved in either pdf, jpeg/jpg, gif, tiff, or png digital file format.
- Images of interpretive signage, digital brochures, fliers, websites, etc.
- Existing program materials that elaborate on how a jurisdiction meets the Criteria for Designation or supports the nomination.
- Other letters of support.

No more than five (5) optional items in total, please.

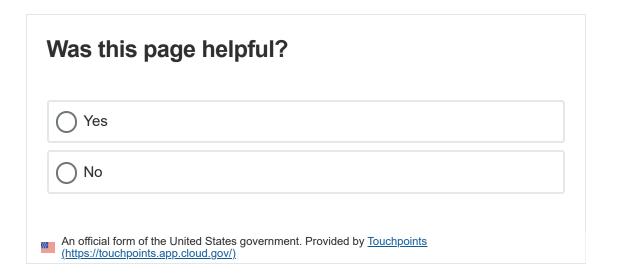
Review Process

Annual events like the Veterans Day Parade and the ongoing efforts to support the Honor Flight Network ensure that the contributions of those who served are continually celebrated.

I believe that Pocatello's history, military significance, and ongoing efforts to preserve and honor its wartime past make it a deserving candidate for the title of an American World War II Heritage City. I am confident that this designation would not only recognize the city's vital role in the war effort but also provide an opportunity for continued education and reflection on Pocatello's historical importance. An American World War II Heritage City Nomination for Pocatello, Idaho

Pocatello, as a city, began as a boxcar depot along a narrow-gauge rail line that connected Salt Lake City to Montana mining operations in the mid to late 1800s, following earlier stagecoach routes. In 1889, Pocatello was incorporated and quickly became a major railroad hub. Its location became a critical junction point for rail and auto, becoming known as the "Gateway to the Northwest". The period between 1889 and the events leading up to World War II included the development of a strong mercantile town and the establishment of an academy which is now known as Idaho State University, all centered on a strong railroad-industrial center. Due to its inland location, and robust railroad services, the stage was set for Pocatello to enlist in support of the war effort during World War II. "Pocatello could offer much to the war effort. Besides the people who served in the armed forces from Pocatello, the city's most visible assistance to the war was as a railroad center, as the location of an Army Air Force training base, and as the site of a Naval Ordnance Plant (NOP)." (Balmforth, 1987) This identity and associated transportation facilities became a critical asset as the United States entered World War II.

The Army Air Base

In 1942, the U.S. Army established an airbase seven miles northwest of Pocatello (which has since been incorporated in the City's boundaries). The airbase, encompassing just over 3,500 acres, became a crucial site for the training of aircrews and was designed to land B-17 and B-24 bombers. One of the B-24 Bombers, named Pocatello Chief fell casualty to the war on March 15, 1944 after being shot down during a bombing mission to Brunswick, Germany. P-39 and P-47 fighters were used for training at the airbase as well. Stationed at the airbase included the 96th and the 382nd Bomber Groups as well as the 453rd (the unit in which movie actor Jimmy Stewart was assigned to during the war) and the 464th. Pocatello was a main flight training facility and just about every pilot, navigator, and bombardier was sent to the airbase for training.

The Pocatello Air Base was a main transfer station for aircraft destined for the Soviet Union as part of the Lend Lease Act. There, U.S. markings were removed from the aircraft and replaced with USSR markings before being sent to Alaska for transfer to the Russian military. The airbase operated as if it were its own city, complete with housing, schools, post office, dining, hospital, chapel, offices and machine shops.

The University of Idaho - Southern Branch (now Idaho State University) provided civilian support for the war effort. The University featured an airfield, University (Ham's) Field, an airframe mechanics program and even featured anti-aircraft weaponry in defense of any possible air attack.

The Pocatello Air Base operated between 1942 and 1945. After being decommissioned, the airbase was deeded to the City of Pocatello on February 20, 1949 and within 2 years began operating as the city-owned Pocatello Municipal Airport (now Pocatello Regional Airport).

Recreation & Education for the Armed Forces

As the airbase came online in 1942 it was quickly made apparent that needed and desired services weren't available. Opportunities for recreation and daily welfare quickly filled this need. An airbase newspaper, *The Bombardier*, was started in November 1942 increasing the servicemen's morale. In the same year, the United Service Organization (USO) established a recreation center in downtown Pocatello which included the use of the Trinity Church's Parish House, housing parties and dances for service men. The USO Hut also provided goods and services for the benefit of service men.

In 1943, the American Association of University Women's Club at the University of Idaho – Southern Branch in Pocatello started the Aviation Squadron Self-Improvement education program at the airbase. Classes were open to any enlisted man on the base and during the first two months, the school had a rapid growth in attendance. More than 15 teachers from the Pocatello city schools donated their time to instruct classes ranging from beginner's reading, writing, and arithmetic to advanced history and English.

The Naval Ordnance Plant

Local factories and businesses shifted production to support the war effort, including manufacturing parts, equipment, and other military necessities. In April 1942, the U.S. Navy commissioned an industrial facility located just outside of Pocatello (which has since been incorporated in the City's boundaries) which primarily refurbished and manufactured naval gun barrels, artillery, and other ordnance components. Known as the Naval Ordnance Plant (N.O.P), this approximately 200-acre complex included about 50 buildings at the height of wartime production. This facility was one of only two such facilities in the country, and the only one west of the Mississippi. Pocatello was selected for this facility due to it being far enough inland to reduce the risk of enemy attack and the fact that the city was equipped as a major railroadhighway hub.

As weapons were manufactured and refurbished in Pocatello, they were then transported about 50 miles north out in the Arco Desert where the Navy established the Naval Proving Ground to test weapons in preparation for them to return to service in the War. This remote site became the future location of the Idaho National Laboratory.

At the end of the War, the N.O.P. was decommissioned and in the 1950's was sold. The facility then became an industrial park with a portion of the complex eventually including facilities for the Federal Bureau of Investigation, a reserve center for the Armed Forces, and a public park named in memory of the wartime facilities (N.O.P. Park).

In June 2021, Industrial Realty Group, LLC (IRG) acquired the complex and rebranded the site as the "Titan Center". Since 2021, IRG has made significant updates to the facilities, sprucing up

exterior facades of buildings, infrastructure improvements, and preparing sites to attract a mix of both industrial and commercial tenants.

Honoring Pocatello's WWII Legacy

In Pocatello, there are several memorials and events that honor both home-front and war-front contributions to the war:

Southeast Idaho Veterans Memorial – Dedicated on November 5, 2005, this monument honors the veterans in Southeast Idaho. Bricks laid within the plaza feature the names of servicemen from various wars and conflicts.

Idaho Gold Star Families Memorial Monument – Dedicated on May 28, 2021, this monument honors Idahoans lost during military service and their families. This monument was made possible with the help of Mr. Hershel "Woody" Williams, last surviving veteran from WWII and a Medal of Honor recipient. (https://idahogoldstarmemorial.com/)

Pocatello Army Air Base Monument – On the 50th anniversary of the Pocatello Army Air Base (1992) a monument was erected near the front of what is now the Pocatello Regional Airport terminal. This monument is dedicated to the veterans from Pocatello and the Squadrons and Bomb Groups who trained and were stationed at the base.

Pearl Harbor Memorial Bridge – Located on W. Fremont Street, crossing the Portneuf River and adjacent to Memorial Park and the Veteran's Memorial Building (ca. 1924–1926). Each year, Bannock County Veteran Services hosts a Pearl Harbor commemoration ceremony honoring the lives lost in that attack. (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=nBI_5MrYizQ)

Annual Veterans Day Parade – Veterans day parades ceased in Pocatello near the end of WWII. In 2022, efforts were made for such a parade to return to the community. Since 2022 this parade has been an annual event. (https://www.pocatelloveteransdayparade.com/)

Living History Flights & Honor Flights – The Commemorative Air Force has selected Pocatello as a stopping point to display and fly arounds for WWII era planes including B-17 and B-25 bombers. (https://commemorativeairforce.org/) The City is actively working with the Honor Flight Network for Pocatello to serve as a hub for its program. (https://www.honorflight.org/)

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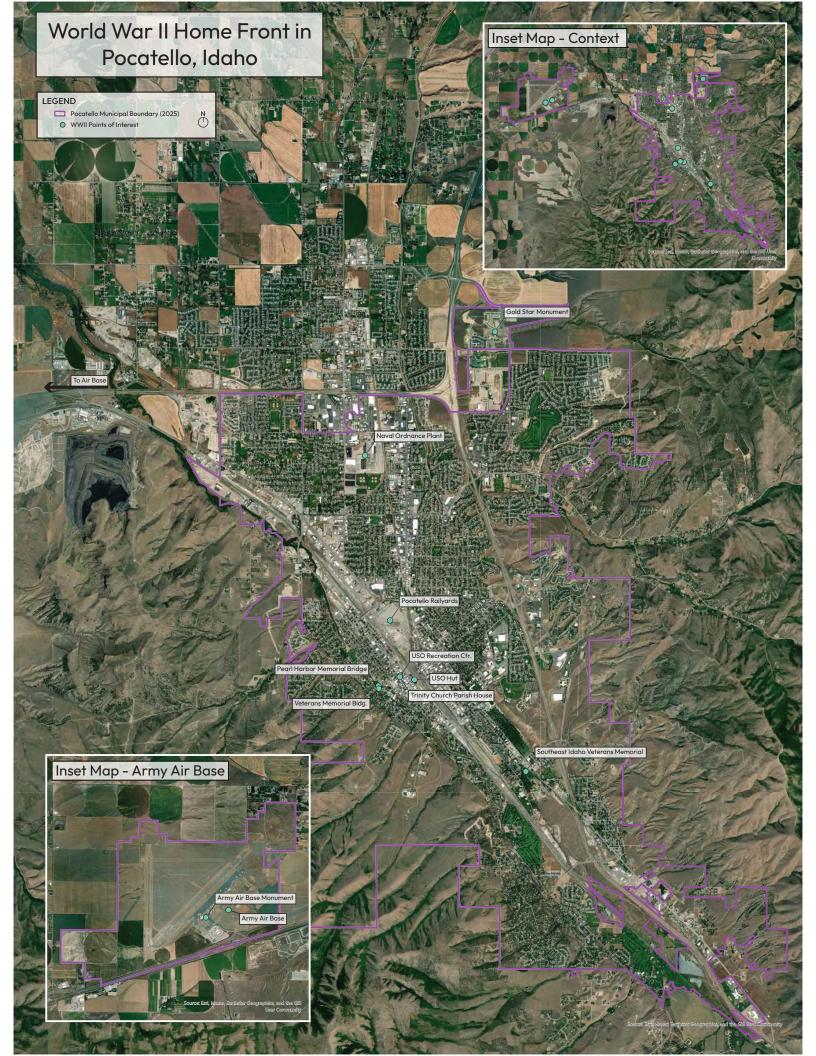
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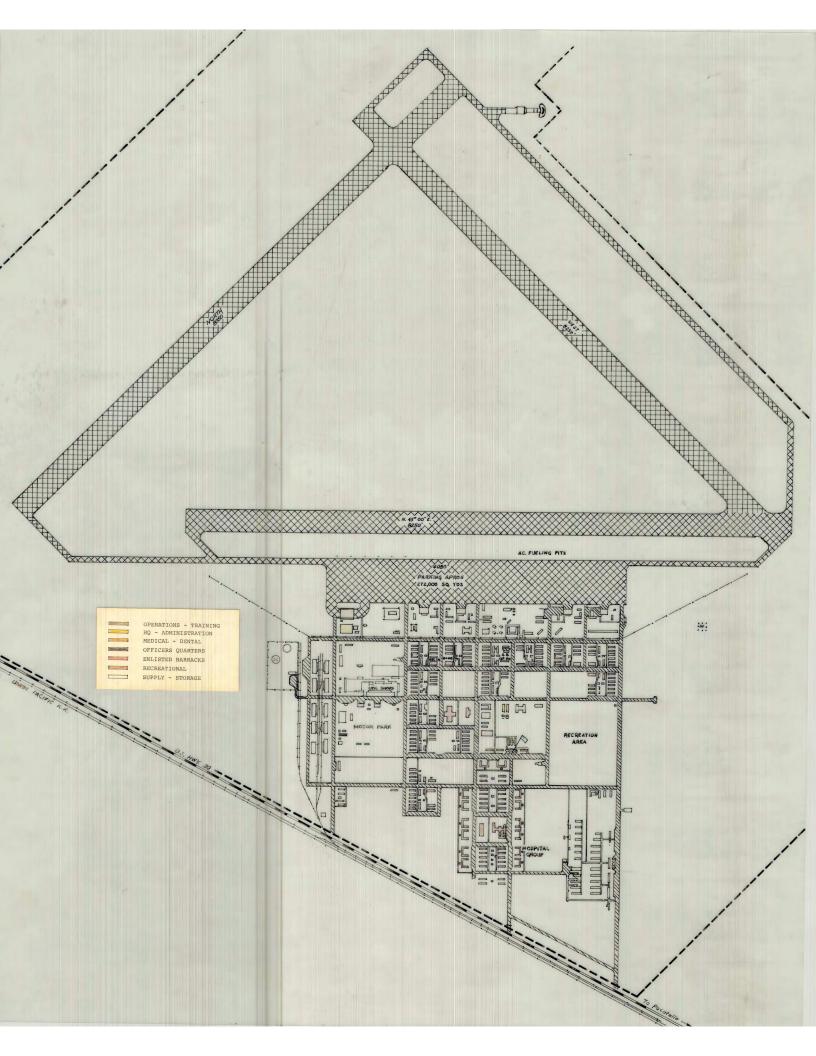

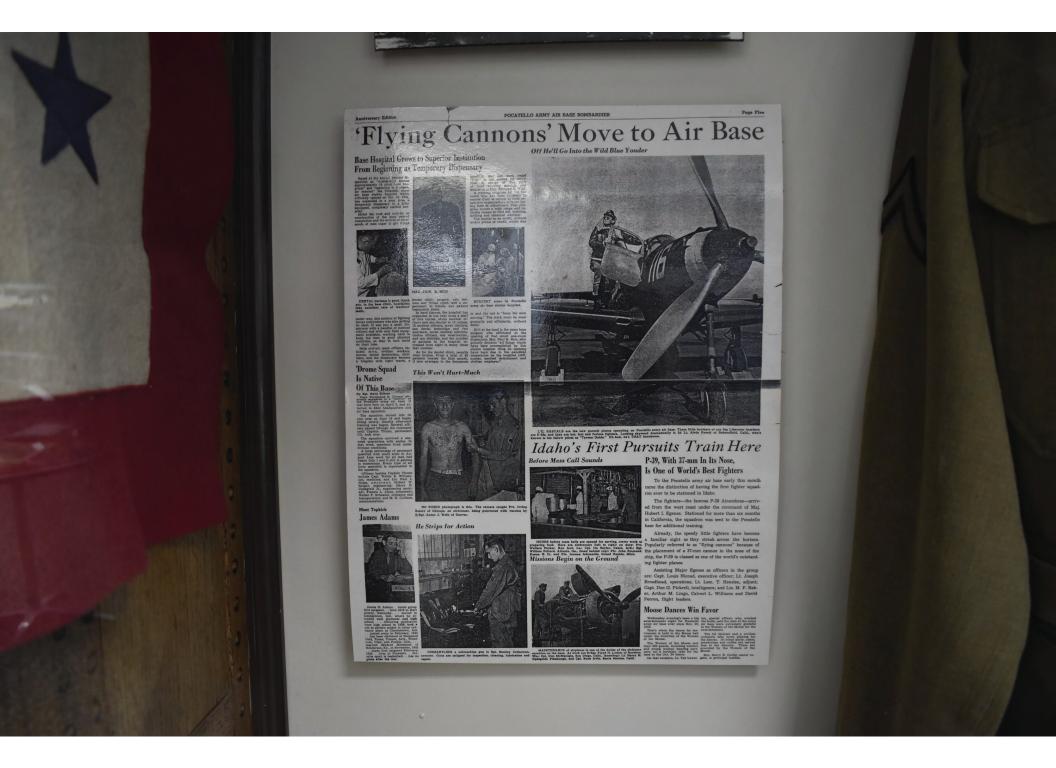














POCATELLO ARMY AIR BASE

Work began on May 22, 1942 and was completed by October 15. Designated by the 2nd Air Force for heavy bombardment training the personnel of the 96th Bomb Group from Rapid City, S.D. formed an Operational Training Unit on October 30, 1942. The B-17s of the 96th BG were later sent to Snetterton Heath, England and Pocatello AAB became a B-24 OTU.

All phases of bomber aircrew training, including pilot, navigator, bombardier and gunners was conducted. Two Heavy Bomber Groups (the 453rd BG - Old Buckenham, England and the 464th BG - Pantanella, Italy) received their training as an entire group.

On February 21, 1944 Pocatello AAB was transferred from the 15th Bomb Wing to the 72nd Fighter Wing for fighter pilot training. The 362nd Fighter Squadron arrived with their P-39s and was quickly converted to P-47 Thunderbolts. American as well as foreign pilots were trained including the 201st Squadron, Mexican Air Force.

In late December 1944 training was discontinued and activities began to be closed down. The base was acquired by the City of Pocatello on February 20, 1949 to become the POCATELLO MUNICIPAL AIRPORT.

Organized 1 September 1989 from new and existing units in the Idaho, Nevada, and Oregon Army National Guard as the 148th Field Artillery, a parent regiment under the United States Army Regimental System, to consist of the 1st Battalion, an element of the 116th Cavalry Brigade

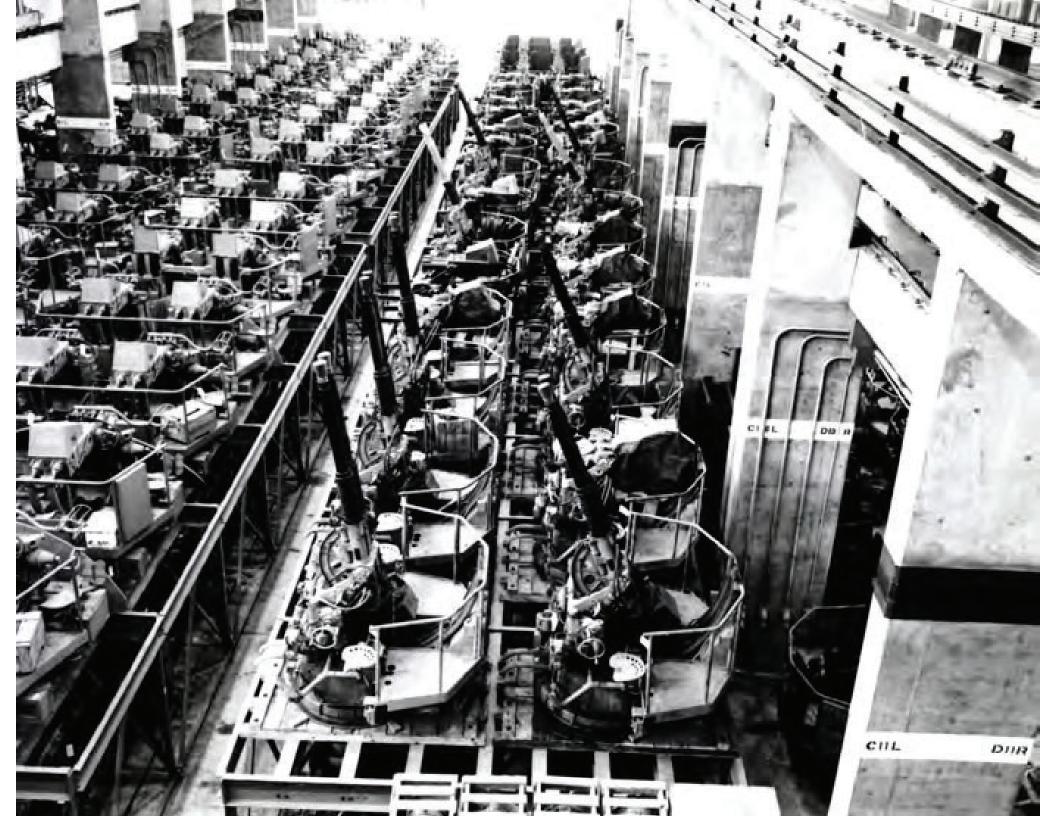




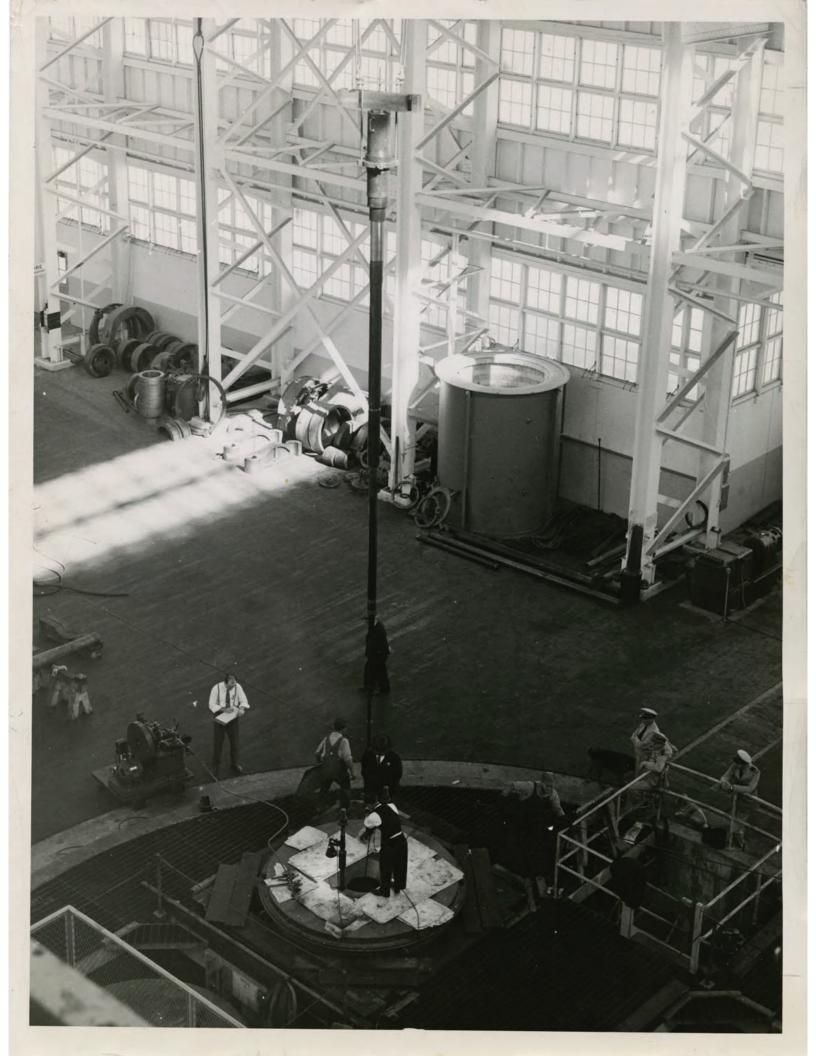

An American World War II Heritage City Nomination for Pocatello, Idaho

Pocatello, as a city, began as a boxcar depot along a narrow-gauge rail line that connected Salt Lake City to Montana mining operations in the mid to late 1800s, following earlier stagecoach routes. In 1889, Pocatello was incorporated and quickly became a major railroad hub. Its location became a critical junction point for rail and auto, becoming known as the "Gateway to the Northwest". The period between 1889 and the events leading up to World War II included the development of a strong mercantile town and the establishment of an academy which is now known as Idaho State University, all centered on a strong railroad-industrial center. Due to its inland location, and robust railroad services, the stage was set for Pocatello to enlist in support of the war effort during World War II. "Pocatello could offer much to the war effort. Besides the people who served in the armed forces from Pocatello, the city's most visible assistance to the war was as a railroad center, as the location of an Army Air Force training base, and as the site of a Naval Ordnance Plant (NOP)." (Balmforth, 1987) This identity and associated transportation facilities became a critical asset as the United States entered World War II.

The Army Air Base

In 1942, the U.S. Army established an airbase seven miles northwest of Pocatello (which has since been incorporated in the City's boundaries). The airbase, encompassing just over 3,500 acres, became a crucial site for the training of aircrews and was designed to land B-17 and B-24 bombers. One of the B-24 Bombers, named Pocatello Chief fell casualty to the war on March 15, 1944 after being shot down during a bombing mission to Brunswick, Germany. P-39 and P-47 fighters were used for training at the airbase as well. Stationed at the airbase included the 96th and the 382nd Bomber Groups as well as the 453rd (the unit in which movie actor Jimmy Stewart was assigned to during the war) and the 464th. Pocatello was a main flight training facility and just about every pilot, navigator, and bombardier was sent to the airbase for training.

The Pocatello Air Base was a main transfer station for aircraft destined for the Soviet Union as part of the Lend Lease Act. There, U.S. markings were removed from the aircraft and replaced with USSR markings before being sent to Alaska for transfer to the Russian military. The airbase operated as if it were its own city, complete with housing, schools, post office, dining, hospital, chapel, offices and machine shops.

The University of Idaho - Southern Branch (now Idaho State University) provided civilian support for the war effort. The University featured an airfield, University (Ham's) Field, an airframe mechanics program and even featured anti-aircraft weaponry in defense of any possible air attack.

The Pocatello Air Base operated between 1942 and 1945. After being decommissioned, the airbase was deeded to the City of Pocatello on February 20, 1949 and within 2 years began operating as the cityowned Pocatello Municipal Airport (now Pocatello Regional Airport).

Recreation & Education for the Armed Forces

As the airbase came online in 1942 it was quickly made apparent that needed and desired services weren't available. Opportunities for recreation and daily welfare quickly filled this need. An airbase newspaper, *The Bombardier*, was started in November 1942 increasing the servicemen's morale. In the same year, the United Service Organization (USO) established a recreation center in downtown Pocatello which included the use of the Trinity Church's Parish House, housing parties and dances for service men. The USO Hut also provided goods and services for the benefit of service men.

In 1943, the American Association of University Women's Club at the University of Idaho - Southern Branch in Pocatello started the Aviation Squadron Self-Improvement education program at the airbase.

Classes were open to any enlisted man on the base and during the first two months, the school had a rapid growth in attendance. More than 15 teachers from the Pocatello city schools donated their time to instruct classes ranging from beginner's reading, writing, and arithmetic to advanced history and English.

The Naval Ordnance Plant

Local factories and businesses shifted production to support the war effort, including manufacturing parts, equipment, and other military necessities. In April 1942, the U.S. Navy commissioned an industrial facility located just outside of Pocatello (which has since been incorporated in the City's boundaries) which primarily refurbished and manufactured naval gun barrels, artillery, and other ordnance components. Known as the Naval Ordnance Plant (N.O.P), this approximately 200-acre complex included about 50 buildings at the height of wartime production. This facility was one of only two such facilities in the country, and the only one west of the Mississippi. Pocatello was selected for this facility due to it being far enough inland to reduce the risk of enemy attack and the fact that the city was equipped as a major railroad-highway hub.

As weapons were manufactured and refurbished in Pocatello, they were then transported about 50 miles north out in the Arco Desert where the Navy established the Naval Proving Ground to test weapons in preparation for them to return to service in the War. This remote site became the future location of the Idaho National Laboratory.

At the end of the War, the N.O.P. was decommissioned and in the 1950's was sold. The facility then became an industrial park with a portion of the complex eventually including facilities for the Federal Bureau of Investigation, a reserve center for the Armed Forces, and a public park named in memory of the wartime facilities (N.O.P. Park).

In June 2021, Industrial Realty Group, LLC (IRG) acquired the complex and rebranded the site as the "Titan Center". Since 2021, IRG has made significant updates to the facilities, sprucing up exterior facades of buildings, infrastructure improvements, and preparing sites to attract a mix of both industrial and commercial tenants.

Honoring Pocatello's WWII Legacy

In Pocatello, there are several memorials and events that honor both home-front and war-front contributions to the war:

Southeast Idaho Veterans Memorial – Dedicated on November 5, 2005, this monument honors the veterans in Southeast Idaho. Bricks laid within the plaza feature the names of servicemen from various wars and conflicts.

Idaho Gold Star Families Memorial Monument – Dedicated on May 28, 2021, this monument honors Idahoans lost during military service and their families. This monument was made possible with the help of Mr. Hershel "Woody" Williams, last surviving veteran from WWII and a Medal of Honor recipient. (https://idahogoldstarmemorial.com/)

Pocatello Army Air Base Monument – On the 50th anniversary of the Pocatello Army Air Base (1992) a monument was erected near the front of what is now the Pocatello Regional Airport terminal. This monument is dedicated to the veterans from Pocatello and the Squadrons and Bomb Groups who trained and were stationed at the base.

Pearl Harbor Memorial Bridge – Located on W. Fremont Street, crossing the Portneuf River and adjacent to Memorial Park and the Veteran's Memorial Building (ca. 1924–1926). Each year, Bannock County Veteran Services hosts a Pearl Harbor commemoration ceremony honoring the lives lost in that attack. (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=nBl_5MrYizQ)

Annual Veterans Day Parade – Veterans day parades ceased in Pocatello near the end of WWII. In 2022, efforts were made for such a parade to return to the community. Since 2022 this parade has been an annual event. (https://www.pocatelloveteransdayparade.com/)

Living History Flights & Honor Flights – The Commemorative Air Force has selected Pocatello as a stopping point to display and fly arounds for WWII era planes including B-17 and B-25 bombers. (https://commemorativeairforce.org/) The City is actively working with the Honor Flight Network for Pocatello to serve as a hub for its program. (https://www.honorflight.org/)





Re: Davey Resource Group Contract

Staff recommend that Council authorize the Mayor's signature on a contract for \$175,000 with Davey Resource Group, subject to Legal Department review. These contract expenses are covered by the US Forest Service Urban and Community Forestry Grant. (ACTION ITEM)

Grant funds will be used to:

- 1. Inventory City trees in City parks and City-managed trees in the Right-of-Way. This includes tree identification, diameter at breast-height (DBH), and tree condition to guide maintenance activities.
- 2. Update the City's 1995 Urban Forest Plan, using this inventory as well as tree canopy data collected in 2018

SHORT FORM OF AGREEMENT BETWEEN CITY OF POCATELLO AND CONSULTANT FOR PROFESSIONAL SERVICES

This is an Agreement between the City of Pocatello, Idaho (Owner) and Davey Resource Group, Unique Entity Identifier: 82-1948528 (Consultant).

Owner's Project, of which Consultant's services under this Agreement are a part, is generally identified as "Urban Forest Plan" (Project).

Consultant's services under this Agreement (Services) are generally identified as follows: complete an Urban Forest Plan and Tree Inventory Project as funded by the US Forest Service grant through the Urban Sustainability Directors Network (Grant Agreement No.: CRS19-Pocatello, ID). Refer to Attachment A, Consultant Scope of Work.

Owner and Consultant further agree as follows:

1.01 Services of Consultant

A. Consultant shall provide or furnish the Services set forth in this Agreement as described in **Attachment A**, and any Additional Services authorized by Owner and consented to by Consultant.

2.01 Owner's Responsibilities

- A. Owner shall provide Consultant with existing Project-related information and data in Owner's possession and needed by Consultant for performance of Consultant Services. Owner will advise the Consultant of Project-related information and data known to Owner but not in Owner's possession. Consultant may use and rely upon Owner-furnished information and data in performing its Services, subject to any express limitations applicable to the furnished items.
 - Following Consultant's assessment of initially-available Project information and data, and upon Consultant's request, Owner shall obtain, furnish, or otherwise make available (if necessary through retention of specialists or consultants) such additional Projectrelated information and data as is reasonably required to enable Consultant to complete its Services; or, with consent of Consultant, Owner may authorize the Consultant to obtain or provide all or part of such additional information and data as Additional Services.
- 3. Owner shall provide necessary direction and make decisions, including prompt review of Consultant's submittals, and carry out its other responsibilities in a timely manner so as not to delay Consultant's performance. Owner shall give prompt notice to Consultant whenever Owner observes or otherwise becomes aware of (1) any relevant, material defect or nonconformance in Consultant's Services, or (2) any development that affects the scope or time of performance of Consultant's Services.
- C. GIS Data Availability: The City will make available to the Consultant, at no cost, the necessary GIS data. This data will include, but not be limited to, parcels, rights-of-way, easements, road

centerlines, curb, gutter and sidewalk, pavement limits, traffic signals, ITS infrastructure, sign locations, storm drain pipes, storm drain structures, sanitary sewer infrastructure, potable water infrastructure, bridges, water features/canals, contours, and aerial imagery.

- GIS Data Restriction: Consultant agrees to restrict its use of the City's GIS data base information solely for the purpose of preparing information related to projects as specified in Exhibit A on behalf of the City.
- GIS Data Security: Consultant agrees to secure the GIS data obtained from the City on a secure, non-public system. Consultant agrees to destroy any duplicated GIS data base information maintained by Consultant and to return any GIS data base information to the City upon completion of compiling digital information regarding projects done on behalf of the City.
- 3. GIS Data Usage Acknowledgments: Consultant acknowledges that some of the City's GIS data base information is subject to Homeland Security restrictions and agrees to limit its access to such information to its application to projects on behalf of the City. The parties agree that the copyright for information from the City's GIS shall remain the property of the City. Consultant agrees that no sale, copying, dissemination, or use other than specified herein of the GIS information is allowed without the written consent of the City.

3.01 Schedule for Rendering Services

- A. Consultant shall complete its Services within the following specific time period: See Attachment A. If no specific time period is indicated, Consultant shall complete its Services within a reasonable period of time.
- B. If, through no fault of Consultant, such periods of time or dates are changed, or the orderly and continuous progress of Consultant's Services is impaired, or Consultant's Services are delayed or suspended, then the time for completion of Consultant's Services, and the rates and amounts of Consultant's compensation, shall be adjusted equitably.

4.01 Invoices and Payments

- A. Invoices: Consultant shall prepare invoices in accordance with its standard invoicing practices and submit the invoices to Owner on a monthly basis. Invoices are due and payable within 30 days of receipt.
- B. Payment: As compensation for Consultant providing or furnishing Services and Additional Services, Owner shall pay Consultant as set forth in this Paragraph 4.01, Invoices and Payments. If Owner disputes an invoice, either as to amount or entitlement, then Owner shall promptly advise Consultant in writing of the specific basis for doing so, may withhold only that portion so disputed, and must pay the undisputed portion.
- C. Failure to Pay: If Owner fails to make any payment due Consultant for Services, Additional Services, and expenses within 30 days after receipt of Consultant's invoice, then (1) the amounts due Consultant will be increased at the rate of 1.0% per month (or the maximum rate of interest permitted by law, if less) from said thirtieth day; (2) in addition Consultant may, after giving 7 days' written notice to Owner, suspend Services under this Agreement until Consultant has been paid in full all amounts due for Services, Additional Services, expenses, and other related charges, and in such case Owner waives any and all claims against Consultant for any such suspension; and (3) if any payment due Consultant remains unpaid after 90 days,

Consultant may terminate the Agreement for cause pursuant to Paragraph 5.01.A.2.

D. Reimbursable Expenses: Consultant is entitled to reimbursement of expenses only if so indicated in Paragraph 4.01.E or 4.01.F. If so entitled, and unless expressly specified otherwise, the amounts payable to Consultant for reimbursement of expenses will be the Project-related internal expenses actually incurred or allocated by Consultant, plus all invoiced external expenses allocable to the Project, including Consultant's subcontractor and subconsultant charges, with the external expenses multiplied by a factor of 1.1.

E. Basis of Payment

1. Consultant shall invoice City on a time and materials basis. Labor shall be based on the labor rates shown in Attachment A. The total contract shall be a fixed fee amount not to exceed the amount listed below.

Fixed fee amount:

- a. \$175,000.00, as shown in Attachment A.
- b. The portion of the compensation amount billed monthly for Consultant's Services will be based upon Consultant's effort actually completed during the billing period.
- 5.01 Additional Services: An additional services amount may be included in this Agreement. If so, the Owner will determine if additional services are required beyond the services outlined in Attachment A. When additional services are required the additional services amount of the Agreement will be utilized, and a subsequent Authorization will be issued. For Additional Services, Owner shall pay Consultant an amount equal to the cumulative hours charged in providing the Additional Services by Consultant's employees, times standard hourly rates for each applicable billing class; plus reimbursement of expenses incurred in connection with providing the Additional Services. Consultant's standard hourly rates are attached in Attachment A.

5.02 Termination

Termination for Cause

- Either party may terminate the Agreement for cause upon 30 days' written notice in the event of substantial failure by the other party to perform in accordance with the terms of the Agreement, through no fault of the terminating party.
 - Notwithstanding the foregoing, this Agreement will not terminate under Paragraph 5.01.A.1 if the party receiving such notice begins, within 7 days of receipt of such notice, to correct its substantial failure to perform and proceeds diligently to cure such failure within no more than 30 days of receipt thereof; provided, however, that if and to the extent such substantial failure cannot be reasonably cured within such 30-day period, and if such party has diligently attempted to cure the same and thereafter continues diligently to cure the same, then the cure period provided for herein will extend up to, but in no case more than, 60 days after the date of receipt of the notice.
- In addition to its termination rights in Paragraph 5.01.A.1, Consultant may terminate this Agreement for cause upon 7 days' written notice (a) if Owner demands that Consultant furnish or perform services contrary to Consultant's responsibilities as a licensed professional, (b) if Consultant's services for the Project are delayed or suspended for more than 90 days for reasons beyond Consultant's control, (c) if payment due Consultant

- remains unpaid for 90 days, as set forth in Paragraph 4.01.C, or (d) as the result of the presence at the Site of undisclosed Constituents of Concern as set forth in Paragraph 6.01.i.
- 3. Consultant will have no liability to Owner on account of any termination by Consultant for cause.
- B. Termination for Convenience: Owner may terminate this Agreement for convenience, effective upon Consultant's receipt of notice from Owner.
- C. Payments Upon Termination: In the event of any termination under Paragraph 5.01, Consultant will be entitled to invoice Owner and to receive full payment for all services performed or furnished in accordance with this Agreement, and to reimbursement of expenses incurred through the effective date of termination. Upon making such payment, Owner will have the limited right to the use of all deliverable documents, whether completed or under preparation, subject to the provisions of Paragraph 6.01.F, at Owner's sole risk.
 - If Owner has terminated the Agreement for cause and disputes Consultant's entitlement
 to compensation for services and reimbursement of expenses, then Consultant's
 entitlement to payment and Owner's rights to the use of the deliverable documents will
 be resolved in accordance with the dispute resolution provisions of this Agreement or
 as otherwise agreed in writing.
 - 2. If Owner has terminated the Agreement for convenience, or if Consultant has terminated the Agreement for cause, then Consultant will be entitled, in addition to the payments identified above, to invoice Owner and receive payment of a reasonable amount for services and expenses directly attributable to termination, both before and after the effective date of termination, such as reassignment of personnel, costs of terminating contracts with Consultant's subcontractors or subconsultants, and other related close-out costs, using methods and rates for Additional Services as set forth in Paragraph 4.01.F.

6.01 General Considerations

- A. The standard of care for all professional consulting and related services performed or furnished by Consultant under this Agreement will be the care and skill ordinarily used by members of the subject profession practicing under similar circumstances at the same time and in the same locality. Consultant makes no warranties, express or implied, under this Agreement or otherwise, in connection with any services performed or furnished by Consultant. Subject to the foregoing standard of care, Consultant may use or rely upon design elements and information ordinarily or customarily furnished by others, including, but not limited to, specialty contractors, manufacturers, suppliers, and the publishers of technical standards.
- B. Consultant shall not at any time supervise, direct, control, or have authority over any Constructor's work, nor will Consultant have authority over or be responsible for the means, methods, techniques, sequences, or procedures of construction selected or used by any Constructor, or the safety precautions and programs incident thereto, for security or safety at the Project site, nor for any failure of a Constructor to comply with laws and regulations applicable to that Constructor's furnishing and performing of its work. Consultant shall not be responsible for the acts or omissions of any Constructor.

- C. Consultant neither guarantees the performance of any Constructor nor assumes responsibility for any Constructor's failure to furnish and perform its work.
- D. Consultant's opinions of probable construction cost (if any) are to be made on the basis of Consultant's experience, qualifications, and general familiarity with the construction industry. However, because Consultant has no control over the cost of labor, materials, equipment, or services furnished by others, or over contractors' methods of determining prices, or over competitive bidding or market conditions, Consultant cannot and does not guarantee that proposals, bids, or actual construction cost will not vary from opinions of probable construction cost prepared by Consultant. If Owner requires greater assurance as to probable construction cost, then Owner agrees to obtain an independent cost estimate.
- E. Consultant shall not be responsible for any decision made regarding the construction contract requirements, or any application, interpretation, clarification, or modification of the construction contract documents, other than those made by Consultant.
- F. All documents prepared or furnished by Consultant are instruments of service, and Consultant retains an ownership and property interest (including the copyright and the right of reuse) in such documents, whether or not the Project is completed. Consultant grants to Owner a limited license to use the deliverable documents on the Project, extensions of the Project, and for related uses of the Owner, subject to receipt by Consultant of full payment due and owing for all Services and Additional Services relating to preparation of the deliverable documents, and subject to the following limitations:
 - 1. Owner acknowledges that such documents are not intended or represented to be suitable for use on the Project unless completed by Consultant, or for use or reuse by Owner or others on extensions of the Project, on any other project, or for any other use or purpose, without written verification or adaptation by Consultant;
 - any such use or reuse, or any modification of the documents, without written verification, completion, or adaptation by Consultant, as appropriate for the specific purpose intended, will be at Owner's sole risk and without liability or legal exposure to Consultant or to its officers, directors, members, partners, agents, employees, and subconsultants;
 - 3. Owner shall indemnify and hold harmless Consultant and its officers, directors, members, partners, agents, employees, and subconsultants from all claims, damages, losses, and expenses, including attorneys' fees, arising out of or resulting from any use, reuse, or modification of the documents without written verification, completion, or adaptation by Consultant; and
 - 4. such limited license to Owner shall not create any rights in third parties.
- G. Owner and Consultant agree to transmit, and accept, Project-related correspondence, documents, text, data, drawings, information, and graphics, in electronic media or digital format, either directly, or through access to a secure Project website, in accordance with a mutually agreeable protocol.
- H. Waiver of Damages; Limitation of Liability: To the fullest extent permitted by law, Owner and Consultant (1) waive against each other, and the other's officers, directors, members, partners, agents, employees, subconsultants, and insurers, any and all claims for or entitlement to special, incidental, indirect, or consequential damages arising out of, resulting

- from, or in any way related to this Agreement or the Project, from any cause or causes, and (2) agree that Consultant's total liability to Owner under this Agreement shall be limited to the total amount of compensation received by Consultant.
- I. The parties acknowledge that Consultant's Services do not include any services related to unknown or undisclosed Constituents of Concern. If Consultant or any other party encounters, uncovers, or reveals an unknown or undisclosed Constituent of Concern, then Consultant may, at its option and without liability for consequential or any other damages, suspend performance of Services on the portion of the Project affected thereby until such portion of the Project is no longer affected, or terminate this Agreement for cause if it is not practical to continue providing Services.
- J. Owner and Consultant agree to negotiate each dispute between them in good faith during the 30 days after notice of dispute. If negotiations are unsuccessful in resolving the dispute, then the dispute will be mediated. If mediation is unsuccessful, then the parties may exercise their rights at law.
- K. This Agreement is to be governed by the laws of the state in which the Project is located.
- L. Consultant's Services do not include: (1) serving as a "municipal advisor" for purposes of the registration requirements of Section 975 of the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act (2010) or the municipal advisor registration rules issued by the Securities and Exchange Commission; (2) advising Owner, or any municipal entity or other person or entity, regarding municipal financial products or the issuance of municipal securities, including advice with respect to the structure, timing, terms, or other similar matters concerning such products or issuances; (3) providing surety bonding or insurance-related advice, recommendations, counseling, or research, or enforcement of construction insurance or surety bonding requirements; or (4) providing legal advice or representation.

7.01 Definitions

- A. Constructor—Any person or entity (not including the Consultant, its employees, agents, representatives, subcontractors, and subconsultants), performing or supporting construction activities relating to the Project, including but not limited to contractors, subcontractors, suppliers, Owner's work forces, utility companies, construction managers, testing firms, shippers, and truckers, and the employees, agents, and representatives of any or all of them.
- B. Constituent of Concern—Asbestos, petroleum, radioactive material, polychlorinated biphenyls (PCBs), lead based paint (as defined by the HUD/EPA standard), hazardous waste, and any substance, product, waste, or other material of any nature whatsoever that is or becomes listed, regulated, or addressed pursuant to laws and regulations regulating, relating to, or imposing liability or standards of conduct concerning, any hazardous, toxic, or dangerous waste, substance, or material.

8.01 Successors, Assigns, and Beneficiaries

A. Successors and Assigns

 Owner and Consultant are hereby bound and the successors, executors, administrators, and legal representatives of Owner and Consultant (and to the extent permitted by Paragraph 8.01.A.2 the assigns of Owner and Consultant) are hereby bound to the other party to this Agreement and to the successors, executors, administrators, and legal representatives (and said assigns) of such other party, in respect of all covenants,

- agreements, and obligations of this Agreement.
- 2. Neither Owner nor Consultant may assign, sublet, or transfer any rights under or interest (including, but without limitation, money that is due or may become due) in this Agreement without the written consent of the other party, except to the extent that any assignment, subletting, or transfer is mandated by law. Unless specifically stated to the contrary in any written consent to an assignment, no assignment will release or discharge the assignor from any duty or responsibility under this Agreement.
- B. Beneficiaries: Unless expressly provided otherwise, nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to create, impose, or give rise to any duty owed by Owner or Consultant to any Constructor, other third-party individual or entity, or to any surety for or employee of any of them. All duties and responsibilities undertaken pursuant to this Agreement will be for the sole and exclusive benefit of Owner and Consultant and not for the benefit of any other party.

9.01 INSURANCE

- A. The Consultant, certifying it is an independent contractor licensed in the State of Idaho, shall acquire and maintain commercial general liability insurance in the amount of \$1,000,000.00 per occurrence, professional liability insurance in the amount of \$1,000,000.00, and worker compensation insurance in accordance with Idaho Law.
- B. The professional liability insurance coverage shall remain in force and effect for a minimum of one (1) year after acceptance of the construction project by the City (if applicable), otherwise for one (1) year after acceptance of the work by the City.
- C. Regarding workers' compensation insurance, the Consultant must provide either a certificate of workers' compensation insurance issued by an insurance company licensed to write workers' compensation insurance in the State of Idaho as evidence that the Consultant has a current Idaho workers' compensation insurance policy in effect, or an extraterritorial certificate approved by the Idaho Industrial Commission from a state that has a current reciprocity agreement with the Idaho Industrial Commission.
- D. The Consultant shall provide the City with certificates of insurance within ten (10) days of the Notice to Proceed.

9.02 NON-APPROPRIATION

A. Notwithstanding anything in the contract documents to the contrary, any and all payments which the City is required to make under this contract shall be subject to appropriation or other availability of funds.

9.03 Total Agreement

A. This Agreement (including any expressly incorporated attachments), constitutes the entire agreement between Owner and Consultant and supersedes all prior written or oral understandings. This Agreement may only be amended, supplemented, modified, or canceled by a duly executed written instrument.

9.04 Anti-Boycott Israel Act

A. Contractor certifies that it is not currently engaged in, and will not for the duration of this Agreement engage in, a boycott of goods or services from Israel or territories under Israel's control. The terms "company" and "boycott Israel" shall have the meanings ascribed to them in Idaho Code § 67-2346.

9.05 Ownership or Operation by China

A. Contractor certifies that it is not a company currently owned or operated by the government of China and will not for the duration of this Agreement be owned or operated by the government of China. The terms "company" and "government of China" shall have the meanings ascribed to them in Idaho Code § 67-2359.

Tree Inventory

The opportunity to standardize the data that will be needed to manage the City's trees will take place during the inventory. To that end, DRG has developed the following inventory specifications:

Revised Tree Inventory Data Spec

- 1. Address/Location—DRG identifies the location of each tree by the following attributes.
 - a. X and Y coordinates in the desired format.
 - b. Park Name. The name of the park (where applicable).
- 2. **Species**—DRG names trees by genus and species using both botanical and common names. If species cannot be determined, genus only will be recorded.
- 3. **Tree Size**—DRG's urban foresters measure the diameter to the nearest inch in 1-inch size classes at 4½ feet above the ground, or diameter at breast height (DBH).
- 4. **Multi-Stem Tree**—DRG notes if a tree has multiple stems on trunks splitting at or below 1 Foot (Yes/No). In cases where trees have multiple stems at 1 foot, DRG will collect the diameter of the largest stem unless otherwise directed.
- 5. **Condition**—Staff consider signs of stress, poor structure, mechanical damage, soil and root problems, disease, and pests in the assessment of tree condition.
 - a. Good. Tree shows no significant problems.
 - b. Fair. Tree has minor problems that may be corrected with time or corrective action.
 - c. Poor. Tree has significant problems that are irrecoverable.
 - d. Dead. Tree shows no sign of life.
 - e. *N/A* Used for vacant sites and stumps. DRG will not collect any new stumps or vacant planting sites as part of this inventory.
- 6. **Primary Maintenance**—DRG assigns one of the following maintenance needs.
 - a. *Priority 1 Removal.* Trees designated for removal have defects that cannot be cost-effectively or practically treated. The majority of the trees in this category have a large percentage of dead crown, and pose a potentially elevated level of risk for failure. Any hazards that could be seen as potential dangers to persons or property and seen as potential liabilities would be in this category. Large dead and dying trees that could be high liability risks are included in this category. These trees are the first ones that should be removed.
 - b. *Priority 2 Removal.* Trees that should be removed but do not pose a liability as great as the first priority will be identified here. This category would need attention as soon as "Priority 1" trees are removed.
 - c. *Priority 3 Removal.* Trees that should be removed, but that pose minimal liability to persons or property, will be identified in this category.
 - d. *Priority 1 Prune.* Trees that require priority one pruning are recommended for trimming to remove hazardous deadwood, hangers, or broken branches. These trees typically have larger deadwood and/or are usually located in high use areas (playgrounds, sports fields, facilities, roads, parking lots, etc.).
 - e. *Priority 2 Prune.* These trees have dead, dying, diseased or weakened branches that should be addressed following Priority 1 pruning work. These trees typically have smaller deadwood and/or are usually located in low use areas (open fields, wooded paths, etc.).
 - f. *Train.* Pruning of young or medium-aged trees to improve tree and branch architecture. These trees can typically be pruned from the ground using a pole pruning tool.

- g. Routine Prune. At the time of inventory, these trees are the lowest priority for pruning. They will require routine pruning or management for tree health or aesthetic appearance. Trees assigned this category can have small deadwood and clearance issues requiring action.
- h. Stump Removal. This category indicates a stump that should be removed. DRG will not collect new stumps during this inventory but will record if a previously collected tree has been removed and a stump remains.
- *i.* Plant. This category indicates a tree should be planted. DRG will not collect vacant planting sites during this inventory but will record if a previously collected tree has been removed.
- 7. **Defect**—DRG records the most significant defect for each tree. Defects are limited to the following to align with the ANSI A300 (Part 9) industry standard and associated *International Society of Arboriculture Best Management Practices—Tree Risk Assessment*, Second Edition (E. Thomas Smiley, Nelda Matheny, and Sharon Lilly 2017):
 - a. Dead and dying branches.
 - b. Broken and/or hanging branches.
 - c. Branch attachment (adventitious, codominant, multiple, overextended).
 - d. Trunk condition (canker, bulges, ridges).
 - e. Cracks.
 - f. Decay or cavity (large trunk wound).
 - g. Tree architecture (lean, bows, taper, live crown ratio).
 - h. Root problem (dead, decayed, missing, abnormal, girdling, lack of flare).
 - i. Other (see site comments).
 - j. No significant defect.
 - k. N/A (default for stumps and vacant sites).
- 8. **Further Inspection**—Trees in this category need added and future inspections due to a variety of issues beyond the scope of a standard tree inventory. Categories for further inspection include:
 - i. Annual inspection (e.g., a tree with a defect requiring annual monitoring).
 - ii. Recent damage inspection (e.g., a healthy tree affected by recent construction or other damage).
 - iii. Advanced risk assessment (e.g., a tree with a defect needing additional or specialized equipment for investigation).
 - iv. Insect/disease monitoring (e.g., a tree that appears to have an emerging insect or disease problem).
 - v. None.

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REQUEST

City Council may authorize the Mayor to execute the Local Professional Services Agreement between Idaho Transportation Department, Keller Associates, Inc., and the City of Pocatello, subject to legal review. There is no additional financial requirement or match for the project. The full match for the grant is covered by local non-profit organizations (Portneuf Health Trust and Portneuf Greenway Foundation).

BACKGROUND

In 2022, the City was awarded a Transportation Alternatives Program grant (TAP) for the Monte Vista to Pocatello Creek Road Pathway Project. The project is ready to proceed to the construction phase.

Local Highway Technical Advisory Council (LHTAC), sent to the City the SLA to initiate the construction phase. Under this agreement, Keller Associates Inc. will perform services that ensures that the project will be constructed in accordance with the established plans and specifications designed for this project, with inspectors monitoring the construction operation during the construction phase.

The match requirements for this TAP Grant is 7.34% for the programed cost. There is no fiscal impact to the City. Funding for the local match was received from local non-profit organizations (Portneuf Health Trust and Portneuf Greenway Foundation), along with the TAP grant funding.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that City Council accept and authorize the Mayor to execute the Local Professional Services Agreement between Idaho Transportation Department, Keller Associates Inc., and the City of Pocatello for construction inspection services for the Monte Vista to Pocatello Creek Rd Pathway project.

CONSULTANT AGREEMENT SPECIFICATIONS Construction Engineering & Inspection

These specifications supplement all Professional and Term agreements for Construction Engineering and Inspection services and shall be attached to said agreements.

I. DEFINITIONS

- Administrator: Person directly responsible for administering a consultant agreement on behalf of the State or a Local Public Agency.
- 2. **Combined Overhead**: The sum of the payroll additives and general administrative overhead expressed as a percent of the direct labor cost.
- Cost: Cost is the sum of the hourly charge out rate and other direct costs.
- 4. **Cost Plus Fixed Fee**: Cost Plus Fixed Fee is the sum of the payroll costs, combined overhead, and other direct costs, plus the fixed fee.
- 5. **CPM**: Critical Path Scheduling. The CPM will list all work tasks, their durations, negotiated milestones and their dates, and all State/Local review periods.
- 6. Fixed Fee: A dollar amount established to cover the Consultant's profit and business expenses not allocable to overhead. The fixed fee is based on a negotiated percent of direct labor cost and combined overhead and shall take into account the size, complexity, duration, and degree of risk involved in the work. The fee is "fixed," i.e. it does not change. If extra work is authorized, an additional fixed fee can be negotiated, if appropriate.
- 7. **General Administrative Overhead (Indirect Expenses)**: The allowable overhead (indirect expenses) expressed as a percent of the direct labor cost.
- 8. **Hourly Charge Out Rate**: The negotiated hourly rate to be paid to the Consultant which includes all overhead for time worked directly on the project.
- 9. **Incentive/Disincentive Clause**: Allows for the increase or decrease of total agreement amount paid based on factors established in the agreement. Normally, these factors will be completion time and completion under budget.
- 10. **Lump Sum**: An agreed upon total amount, that will constitute full payment for all work described in the Agreement.
- 11. **Milestones**: Negotiated portions of projects to be completed within the negotiated time frame. Normally the time frame will be negotiated as a calendar date, but it could also be "working" or "calendar" days. As many milestones as the Consultant and the State believe necessary for the satisfactory completion of the agreement will be negotiated.
- 12. **Not-To-Exceed Amount**: The Agreement amount is considered to be a Not-to-Exceed amount, which amount shall be the maximum amount payable and shall not be exceeded unless adjusted by a Supplemental Agreement.
- 13. **Other Direct Costs**: The out-of-pocket costs and expenses directly related to the project that are not a part of the normal company overhead expense.
- 14. **Payroll Additives:** All payroll additives allocable to payroll costs such as FICA, State Unemployment Compensation, Federal Unemployment Compensation, Group Insurance,

Workmen's Compensation, Holiday, Vacation, and Sick Leave. The payroll additive is expressed as a percent of the direct labor cost.

- 15. **Payroll Costs (Direct Labor Cost)**: The actual salaries paid to personnel for the time worked directly on the project. Payroll costs are referred to as direct labor cost.
- 16. **State**: Normally "State" refers to the Idaho Transportation Department. However, in the case of Local Sponsor projects, "State" may be interchangeable with "Sponsor", "Agreement Administrator" or just "Administrator".
- 17. **Unit Prices**: The allowable charge out rate for units or items directly related to the project that are not a part of the normal overhead expense.

NOTE: All cost accounting procedures, definitions of terms, payroll cost, payroll additives, general administrative overhead, direct cost, and fixed fee shall comply with Federal Acquisition Regulations, 48 CFR, Part 31 and be supported by audit accepted by the State.

II. STANDARD OF PERFORMANCE

The Consultant agrees that all work performed under this agreement will be performed professionally in accordance with the ITD Construction Manual, Standard Specifications for Highway Construction – Subsections 105.10 and 111, and other appropriate standards. The Consultant shall be responsible for construction engineering and inspection on all tasks assigned (as stated in the Scope of Services) when on duty to ensure they are constructed in substantial conformance to the plans, special provisions and specifications.

The Consultant shall identify and recommend corrections for any omissions, substitutions, defects and deficiencies in the work of the Contractor.

III. AGREEMENT ADMINISTRATOR

The Agreement Administrator will administer this agreement for performance and payment, and will decide all questions which may arise as to quality and acceptability of the work, rate of progress, definition of work to be performed, and acceptable fulfillment of this Agreement. The Consultant shall address all correspondence, make all requests, and deliver all documents to the Administrator. The Administrator shall be responsible for the timely coordination of all work performed by the State or their representatives.

IV. PERSONNEL

The Consultant shall provide adequate staff of experienced personnel or subconsultants capable of and devoted to the successful accomplishment of work to be performed under this agreement. The specific individuals or subconsultants listed in the agreement, including Project Manager, shall be subject to approval by the State and shall not be removed or replaced without the prior written approval of ITD. Replacement personnel submitted for approval must have qualifications, experience and expertise at least equal to those listed in the proposal

V. SUBCONSULTANTS

The Consultant shall have sole responsibility for the management, direction, and control of each Subconsultant and shall be responsible and liable to the State for the satisfactory performance and quality of work performed by Subconsultants under the terms and conditions of this Agreement. The Consultant shall include all the applicable terms and conditions of this Agreement in each

Subconsultant Agreement between the Consultant and Subconsultant, and provide the State with a copy of each Subconsultant Agreement prior to the Subconsultant beginning work. No other Subconsultant shall be used by the Consultant without prior written consent by the State.

VI. DIRECT COST

It is understood that overtime will be incurred after forty (40) hours of work for this agreement during each week. When the need for overtime has been approved by the Agreement Administrator, the overhead rate and fee are **not** to be applied to the premium time paid.

The out-of-pocket cost and expenses directly related to the project must be pre-approved and agreed to, by the Agreement Administrator, prior to receiving any compensation. Relocation, lodging and Per Diem cost will not be allowed for this type of agreement unless agreed and pre-approved by the Agreement Administrator.

VII. PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AUTHORIZATION

- 1. A written PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AUTHORIZATION (PSA) will be issued by the State to authorize the Consultant to proceed with a specific portion of the work under this Agreement. The number of PSAs required to accomplish all the work under this Agreement is one to several. Each PSA will authorize a maximum dollar amount for which the PSA represents. The State assumes no obligation of any kind for expenses incurred by the Consultant prior to the issuance of the PSA; for any expenses incurred by the Consultant for services performed outside the work authorized by the PSA; and for any dollar amount greater than authorized by the PSA.
- 2. It is not necessary for a PSA to be completed prior to the issuance of the next PSA. The Consultant shall not perform work which has not been authorized by a PSA. When the money authorized by a PSA is nearly exhausted, the Consultant shall inform the Administrator of the need for the next PSA. The Administrator must concur with the Consultant prior to the issuance of the next PSA.
- 3. The Agreement amount is lump sum, unit cost, or cost plus fixed fee amount for the negotiated services and an additional services amount is set up for possible extra work not contemplated in original scope of work. For the Consultant to receive payment for any work under the additional services amount of this Agreement, said work must be performed under a PSA issued by the State. Should the State request that the Consultant perform additional services, then the scope of work and method of payment will be negotiated. The basis of payment for additional work will be set up either as a Lump Sum or Cost Plus Fixed Fee.

VIII. MONTHLY PROGRESS REPORT

The Consultant shall submit to the State a monthly progress report on Form ITD-771, as furnished by the State.

The monthly progress report will be submitted by the tenth of each month following the month being reported or as agreed upon in the scope of services.

The Agreement Administrator will review the progress report and submit approved billings for payment within two weeks of receiving monthly report.

Each progress report shall list billings by PSA number and reference milestones.

IX. PROGRESS AND FINAL PAYMENTS

 Progress payments will be made once a month for services performed which qualify for payment under the terms and conditions of the Agreement. Such payment will be made based on invoices submitted by the Consultant in the format required by the State. The monthly invoice shall be submitted by the tenth of each month following the month being invoiced.

Lump Sum

Progress payments will be made, based on a percentage of the work or milestones satisfactorily completed.

Cost Plus Fixed Fee

The Consultant shall submit a breakdown of costs by each item of work on the monthly invoice, and shall show the percent complete of each item of work, each milestone and percent complete of the entire Agreement. Progress payments will be made based on the invoiced cost less the fixed_fee for the work satisfactorily completed for each billing period. Said payment shall not exceed the percent complete of the entire Agreement. Upon satisfactory completion of each milestone, full payment for all approved work performed for that milestone will be made including Fixed Fee.

Cost

The Consultant shall submit a breakdown of costs by each item of work on the monthly invoice, and shall show the percent complete of each item of work and percent complete of the entire Agreement. Progress payments will be made based on the invoiced cost for the work satisfactorily completed for each item of work. Said payment shall not exceed the percent complete of the entire Agreement.

Direct expenses will be reimbursed at actual cost, not to exceed the current approved rates as identified at http://itd.idaho.gov/business/?target=consultant-agreements.

For "Cost Plus Fixed Fee" and "Cost" agreements, invoices must include backup documentation to support expenditures as appropriate, and as requested by the Agreement Administrator. Such support may consist of copies of time sheets or cost accounting system print-out of employee time, and receipts for direct expenses.

2. The State will make full payment for the value of the services performed which qualify for payment. This full payment will apply until 95 percent of the work under each Project Agreement or Work Task has been completed. No further progress payments will be made until all work under the individual agreement has been satisfactorily accomplished.

If at any time, the State determines that the work is not progressing in a satisfactory manner, the State may refuse to make full progress payments and may withhold from any progress payment(s) such sums that are deemed appropriate for unsatisfactory services.

- 3. Final payment of all amounts retained shall be due 90 days after all work under the Agreement has been completed by the Consultant and accepted by the State. Such final payment will not be made until satisfactory evidence by affidavit is submitted to the State that all indebtedness incurred by the Consultant on this project has been fully satisfied.
- 4. Agreements which include an incentive/disincentive clause will normally have the clause applied only to the completion of the milestones identified.
- 5. Payments to Subconsultants

Consultant shall pay each subconsultant for satisfactory performance of its contract items no later than twenty (20) calendar days from receipt of each payment the consultant receives from the State, in accordance with 49 CFR, Part 26. The consultant shall return retainage

payments to each subconsultant within twenty (20) calendar days after the subconsultant's work is satisfactorily completed. The Consultant will verify that payment or retainage has been released to the subconsultant or suppliers within the specified time for each partial payment or partial acceptance by the Department through entries in the Department's online diversity tracking system during the corresponding monthly audits.

Prompt payment will be monitored and enforced through the Consultant's reporting of monthly payments to its subconsultants and suppliers in the online diversity tracking system. Subconsultants, including lower tier subconsultants, suppliers, or both, will confirm the timeliness and the payment amounts received utilizing the online diversity tracking system. Discrepancies will be investigated by the Contract Compliance Officer and the Contract Administrator. Payments to the subconsultants, including lower tier subconsultants, and including retainage release after the subconsultant or lower tier subconsultant's work has been accepted, will be reported monthly by the Consultant or the subconsultant.

The Consultant will ensure its subconsultants, including lower tier subconsultants, and suppliers meet these requirements.

X. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

1. COVENANT AGAINST CONTINGENT FEES

a. The Consultant warrants that they have not:

Employed or retained for a commission, percentage, brokerage, contingent fee, or other consideration, any firm or person to solicit or secure this contract, other than a bona fide employee of the firm;

agreed, as an expressed or implied condition for obtaining this contract, to employ or retain the services of any firm or person in connection with carrying out the contract, or:

paid, or agreed to pay, to any firm, organization or person (other than a bona fide employee of the firm) any fee, contribution, donation, or consideration of any kind for, or in connection with, procuring or carrying out the contract.

b. The State warrants that the above consulting firm, or firm representative, has not been required, directly or indirectly as an expressed or implied condition in connection with obtaining or carrying out this contract to:

Employ or retain, or agree to employ or retain, any firm or person, or; pay, or agree to pay to any firm, person or organization, any fee, contribution, donation or consideration of any kind.

2. PROHIBITION AGAINST HIRING PERSONNEL AND WORKING FOR CONTRACTOR

In compliance with the Code of Federal Regulations, (23 CFR, Section 1.33, Conflict of Interest), the Consultant agrees that no one in their employ will work on a part time basis under this Agreement while also in the full-time employ of any Federal Agency or the State, without the written consent of the public employer of such person. The Consultant agrees that no one in their employ under any circumstances shall perform any services for the contractor on the construction of this project. This includes employees who leave the Consultant's employment.

3. CHANGES IN WORK

All changes in work shall conform to one or more of the following conditions and in no instance shall such change in work be undertaken without written order or written approval of the State.

- a. Increase in the work required by the State due to unforeseen circumstances.
- Revision in the work required by the State subsequent to acceptance of such work at the appropriate conference or after revision of such work as outlined at said conference.
- Items of work which are beyond the scope of intent of this Agreement and preapproved by the State.
- d. Reduction in the work required by the State due to unforeseen circumstances.

An increase in compensation shall not result from underestimating the complexity of the work.

Adjustment in compensation for either an increase or reduction in work shall be on a negotiated basis arrived at by mutual agreement between the State and the Consultant. During such negotiations the State may examine the documented payrolls, transportation and subsistence costs paid employees actively engaged in the performance of a similar item or items of work on the project, and by estimated overhead and profit from such similar items or items of work.

Said mutual agreement for a negotiated increase or reduction in compensation shall be determined prior to commencement of operations for an increase in a specific item or items of work. In the case of State order for nonperformance a reduction in the specific item or items of work will be made as soon as circumstances permit. In the event that a mutual agreement is not reached in negotiations for an increase in work, the State will use other methods to perform such item or items of work.

The mutually agreed amount shall be covered by a Supplemental Agreement and shall be added to or subtracted from the total amount of the original Agreement.

Adjustment of time to complete the work as may pertain to an increase or a reduction in the work shall be arrived at by mutual agreement of the State and the Consultant after study of the change in scope of the work.

4. DELAYS AND EXTENSIONS

- a. Extensions of time may be granted for the following reasons:
 - Delays in major portions of the work caused by excessive time used in processing of submittals, delays caused by the State, or other similar items which are beyond the control of the Consultant.
 - ii. Additional work ordered in writing by the State.
- b. Extensions of time will not be granted for the following reasons:
 - i. Underestimating complexity of work.
 - ii. Redoing work rejected by the State.

5. TERMINATION

The State may terminate or abandon this Agreement at any time upon giving notice of termination hereof as hereinafter provided, for any of the following reasons:

- Evidence that progress is being delayed consistently below the progress indicated in a schedule of operations given to the State at meetings and conferences herein provided for.
- b. Continued submission of sub-standard work.
- c. Violation of any of the terms of conditions set forth in the Agreement, other than for the reasons set forth in a and b above.
- d. At the convenience of the State.

Prior to giving notice of termination for the reasons set forth in a and b above, the State shall notify the Consultant in writing of any deficiencies or default in the performance of the terms of this Agreement, and said Consultant shall have ten (10) days thereafter in which to correct or remedy any such default or deficiency, and upon their failure to do so within said ten (10) days, or for the reasons set forth in 3 above, such notice of termination in writing shall be given by the State. Upon receipt of said notice the Consultant shall immediately discontinue all work and service unless directed otherwise, and shall transfer all documents pertaining to the work and services covered under this Agreement, to the State. Upon receipt by the State of said documents, payment shall be made to the Consultant as provided herein for all acceptable work and services.

6. DISPUTES

Should any dispute arise as to performance or abnormal conditions affecting the work, such dispute shall be referred to the Director of the Idaho Transportation Department or his duly authorized representative(s) for determination.

Such determination shall be final and conclusive unless, within thirty (30) days of receipt of the decision Consultant files for arbitration. Consultant agrees that any arbitration hearing shall be conducted in Boise, Idaho. Consultant and State agree to be bound by the decision of the arbitration. Expenses incurred due to the arbitration will be shared equally by the parties involved.

7. ACCEPTANCE OF WORK

- a. The Consultant warrants that all work submitted shall be in accordance with good professional practices and shall meet tolerances of accuracy required by State practices and procedures.
- Acceptance of the work shall not constitute a waiver of any of the State's rights under this agreement or in any way relieve the consultant of any liability under their warranty or otherwise.
- c. It is understood by the Consultant that the State is relying upon the professional expertise and ability of the Consultant in performance of this contract. Any examination of the Consultant's work product by the State will not be considered acceptance or approval of the work product which would relieve the Consultant for any liability or expense.

Acceptance or approval of any portion of Consultant's work product by the State or payment, partial or final, shall not constitutes a waiver of any rights the State may have against the Consultant. The Consultant shall respond to the State's notice of any error or omission within twenty four hours of receipt, and give immediate attention to any corrections to minimize any delay to the construction contract.

If the Consultant discovers errors or omissions in its work, it shall notify the State within seven days of discovery. Failure of the Consultant to notify the State shall be grounds for termination of the agreement.

The Consultant's liability for damages incurred by the State due to negligent acts, errors or omissions by the Consultant in its work shall be borne by the Consultant. Increased construction costs resulting from errors, omissions or negligence in Consultant's work product shall not be the Consultant's responsibility unless the additional construction costs were the result of gross negligence of the Consultant.

8. OWNERSHIP OF DOCUMENTS

All material acquired or produced by the Consultant in conjunction with this project, shall become the property of, and be delivered to, the State without restrictions or limitations of their further use. However, in any case, the Consultant has the right to make and retain copies of all data and documents for project files. Documents provided to the State may be public records under the Public Records Act §§ 74-101 through 74-126 and Idaho Code §§ 9-338 *et seq*, and thus subject to public disclosure unless excepted by the laws of the state of Idaho, otherwise ordered by the courts of the state of Idaho, and/or otherwise protected by relevant state and/or federal law.

9. INDEMNITY

Concerning claims of third parties, the Consultant and the State to the extent the State may do so will indemnify, save harmless and defend each other from the damages of and against any and all suits, actions, claims or losses of every kind, nature and description, including costs, expenses and reasonable attorney fees that may be incurred by reason of any negligent act, error or omission of the Consultant or the State in the prosecution of the work which is the subject of this Agreement.

Concerning claims of the State, the Consultant shall assume the liability and responsibility for negligent acts, errors or omissions caused by the Consultant or their agents or employees to the assignments completed under this Agreement, to the standards accepted at the time of work, and until one (1) year after the project construction has been completed. The State shall have until that time to give the consultant notice of the claim.

Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, the Consultant shall not be responsible for claims arising from the willful misconduct or negligent acts, errors, or omissions of the State for contamination of the project site which pre-exist the date of this Agreement or subsequent Task Authorizations. Pre-existing contamination shall include but not be limited to any contamination or the potential for contamination, or any risk to impairment of health related to the presence of hazardous materials or substances. The State agrees to indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the Consultant from and against any claim, liability or defense cost related to any such pre-existing contamination except for claims caused by the negligence, or willful misconduct of the Consultant.

The Consultant, its agents, officials, employees, and subconsultant will be authorized representatives for the State and shall be protected against all suits, actions, claims or cost, expenses and attorney fees in accordance with Subsection 107.10 of the Standard Specifications for Highway Construction 2012; and shall be protected against all personal liability in accordance with Subsection 107.13 of the Standard Specifications for Highway Construction 2012.

10. INSURANCE

The Consultant, certifying it is an independent contractor licensed in the State of Idaho, shall acquire and maintain commercial general liability insurance in the amount of \$500,000.00 per occurrence, and worker compensation insurance in accordance with Idaho Law.

Regarding workers' compensation insurance, the consultant must provide either a certificate of workers' compensation insurance issued by an insurance company licensed to write workers' compensation insurance in the State of Idaho as evidence that the consultant has a current Idaho workers' compensation insurance policy in effect, or an extraterritorial certificate approved by the Idaho Industrial Commission from a state that has a current reciprocity agreement with the Idaho Industrial Commission.

The Consultant shall provide the State with certificates of insurance within ten (10) days of the Notice to Proceed.

11. LEGAL COMPLIANCE

The Consultant at all times shall observe and comply with all Federal, State and local laws, by-laws, safety laws, and any and all codes, ordinances and regulations affecting the work in any manner. The Consultant agrees that any recourse to legal action pursuant to this agreement shall be brought in the District Court of the State of Idaho, situated in Ada County, Idaho.

12. SUBLETTING

The services to be performed under this Agreement shall not be assigned, sublet, or transferred except by written consent of the State. Written consent to sublet, transfer or assign any portions of the work shall not be construed to relieve the Consultant of any responsibility for the fulfillment of this Agreement or any portion thereof.

13. PERMITS AND LICENSES

The Consultant shall procure all permits and licenses, pay all charges, fees, and taxes and give all notices necessary and incidental to the due and lawful prosecution of the work.

14. PATENTS

The Consultant shall hold and save the State and its agents harmless from any and all claims for infringement by reason of the use of any patented design, device, material process, trademark, or copyright.

15. NON-DISCRIMINATION ASSURANCES

This scope of work is to provide Construction Engineering, Inspection & Sampling (CE&I) Services to include contract administration, inspection, and project office documentation under the general direction of the assigned Local Highway Technical Assistance Council (LHTAC) Resident Engineer, for construction of the South 5th Avenue project located in Pocatello for the City of Pocatello (SPONSOR). Keller Associates (CONSULTANT) will provide the LHTAC with experienced management, construction administration, and inspection personnel. Through this contract, CONSULTANT will inspect and document to ITD standards, the activities associated with the project to the level necessary to administer the contract.

CONSULTANT's role is limited to the scope of services described herein and is working under the authority of the LHTAC. CONSULTANT shall not have the authority to modify the Contract Documents, scope of Contractor's Work, performance times, or payment to the Contractor. The LHTAC is responsible for authorizing all changes to the Contract Documents, approving all payments to the Contractor, and final acceptance of the Work.

The following tasks represent the individual services that are to be provided by CONSULTANT under this agreement:

PRIMARY TASKS:

- 1. <u>Construction Administration</u> CONSULTANT will provide the qualified personnel necessary to administer the Plans, Special Provisions, and Specifications of the project to ensure the project is accepted by the LHTAC and the SPONSOR. The following sub-tasks represent a partial list of those activities necessary to administer the contract.
 - 1.1. Submittal Log & Minimum Testing Requirements (MTR's) CONSULTANT will develop a list of required submittals for the project prior to start of construction and will also track and maintain a log of shop drawings and submittals and encourage reviewers to complete their review in a timely manner. Deficiencies will be promptly reported. CONSULTANT will also develop the MTR list for the project prior to start of construction. This information will be used to track the materials testing required on the project and coordination of the testing lab responsible for processing of samples and reporting results.

- i. Minimum Testing Requirements (MTR's) will be prepared for review and approval by the LHTAC Resident Engineer.
- ii. MTRs will be based on the ITD Quality Assurance Manual, 2024 Buy America Insert, and 2023 Quality Assurance Special Provision for State Acceptance (12/7/2023), with

modifications requiring all sampling and testing to be the responsibility of the Contractor.

1.2. Pre-Construction Conference – CONSULTANT will facilitate the Pre-Construction Conference including forms and exhibits provided by or coordinated with the LHTAC.

Performance Assumptions:

- i. The meeting will be held at City offices in-person. The CONSULTANT'S project manager and lead inspector will attend.
- i. Coordinate and perform one (1) conference with the Local Sponsor, the LHTAC, the Contractor, Utilities, and other applicable parties.
- ii. Prepare and distribute the pre-con meeting minutes.
- 1.3. Labor Compliance The Contractor's and Sub-contractor's certified payroll wage rates will be verified, documented, and tracked for format, classification, pay scale, timely submissions, and concurrence with field reviews.

Performance Assumptions:

- i. CONSULTANT will review and present subcontracts for approval by the LHTAC prior to start of work.
- ii. Maintain filing system for certified payrolls and EEO compliance reports using ITD 2002 form and notify contractors on incorrect classification, pay scales, etc.
- iii. Conduct labor interviews (ITD 2014), complete CUF interviews (ITD 1701) for all DBE firms and notify contractors on incorrect classification, pay scales, etc.

Post contract bid item testing and certification documentation to ProjectWise CONSULTANT will post acceptance certifications and testing results for each bid item to ProjectWise using the current (at time of SOW development) ITD outlined file attribute method. CONSULTANT will post material test reports within 24 hours of receiving documentation.
- v. AASHTOWare will not be used for this project.
- 1.6. Progress Estimate Preparation For each scheduled progress estimate, documentation will be prepared for and presented to the LHTAC Resident that contains the quantities and backup for each bid item payment with a summary sheet showing the amounts to be paid. Final check and authorization will be by LHTAC. Materials test reports and certifications will be checked and posted into Projectwise.

- i. Prepare monthly pay estimate packages, a total of 3 estimates are anticipated.
- ii. ITD 2242 Time Accounting form will be provided with each pay estimate development.
- 1.7. Materials Certifications Certifications, as required by bid item, will be requested for all materials incorporated into the project. No materials will be accepted for payment until the certifications are received and reviewed for acceptance.

Each invoice package will contain approved timesheets for all labor expended and appropriate backup for all direct costs. CONSULTANT will formally notify the Agreement Administrator upon reaching the expended contract amount. Four invoices are anticipated.
- 1.11. Change Orders CONSULTANT will submit Change Orders for review and processing by the LHTAC Resident Engineer. Contract Time accounting will be reviewed for time adjustment by Critical Path Method analysis when warranted by change orders.

- CONSULTANT will consult with the SPONSOR and the LHTAC Resident Engineer and prepare the change order form and backup information for review by the LHTAC Resident Engineer.
- ii. LHTAC and SPONSOR will provide approval of Change Orders.

- ii. CPM Schedule Review The contractor's CPM Schedule will be reviewed to ensure that activity dates are correctly recorded for accuracy.
- iii. Submittals Consultant will review submittals for material to be incorporated into project per the specifications.
- iv. Interpretations and Clarifications It is expected that CONSULTANT will perform routine interpretations and clarifications on the project. Sensitive decisions and interpretations or those that effect Erosion and Environmental permitting will be reviewed by the LHTAC Resident Engineer prior to final disposition.
- v. Shop Drawings Consultant will transmit shop drawings for their review and approval. Consultant will notify LHTAC when these are transmitted. CONSULTANT will notify the LHTAC Resident Engineer when shop drawings are transmitted for external review.
- vi. Contractor source approval requests, staging area requests, and waste site approval requests will be reviewed and approved through coordination with the LHTAC with the LHTAC Resident Engineer.
- vii. Hot Mix Asphalt designs will be processed and approved through coordination with the LHTAC Resident Engineer and ITD's Pavement Engineer per the QA Manual requirements.
- viii. Contractor concrete mix designs will be processed and approved through coordination with the LHTAC Resident Engineer and ITD's Materials Engineer per the QA Manual requirements.
- ix. CONSULTANT will check items found on the ITD Qualified Products List prior to the material being incorporated into the project.

- x. CONSULTANT will review the Stormwater Pollution Prevention Plan (PPP) and recommend corrections to the LHTAC Resident Engineer and Contractor.
- xi. LHTAC will provide approval of submittals and RFIs as needed for issues that cannot be resolved by CONSULTANT staff.
- 1.13. Public Relations CONSULTANT will respond to and coordinate public inquiries and/or concerns with the Contractor and the LHTAC Resident Engineer for appropriate action. Records of contacts and responses will be maintained
- 1.14. Prompt Payment & DBE Race Neutral prior to final payment and release of retainage, CONSULTANT will collect the TAP-specific prompt payment notarized forms from each subcontractor. CONSULTANT will also collect payment information (in lieu of B2GNow) to provide to the LHTAC Resident Engineer.
- 1.15. Pre-paving Meeting CONSULTANT will facilitate a pre-paving meeting with the Contractor as appropriate.

- i. Coordinate and perform one (1) pre-pave meeting with LHTAC and the Contractor.
- ii. The Pre-paving Meeting will occur during a regularly scheduled progress meeting.
- iii. The meeting to be held in person. The CONSULTANT'S project manager may attend virtually, and lead inspector will attend in person.
- iv. Prepare and distribute one (1) pre-pave agenda and minutes.
- Survey Verification CONSULTANT will check and verify Contractor surveys for accuracy and
 compliance with the plans and specifications. This work will be conducted by the CONSULTANT'S
 inspection staff during normal inspection hours. If it is determined by the CONSULTANT and the
 LHTAC Resident Engineer that the CONSULTANT'S surveyor is needed for verification, additional
 compensation may be negotiated.
- 3. <u>Project Inspection</u> Inspection will be performed by CONSULTANT on an as-needed basis. The SPONSOR may augment inspection but cannot be reimbursed by project costs.
 - 3.1. Inspections and Inspector Diaries Inspection is assumed to occur for an average of 3 hours per day including travel. Daily reports will be prepared to record the Contractor's hours on the site, weather conditions, data relative to questions of change orders, field orders, or changed conditions, site visitors, daily activities, labor compliance interviews, civil rights compliance postings, decisions, observations in general, and specific observations in more detail as the case of observing test procedures. Project diaries will be maintained in the project files. Certificates of inspections, tests, and approvals required by the Contract Documents will be received and reviewed.
 - 3.2. Identify and Recommend Corrections- Perform construction site inspections of the Contractor activities. Identify non-compliant work including any omissions, substitutions, defects and

- deficiencies in the work of the Contractor discovered by CONSULTANT during project inspection and document with recommendations to the LHTAC Resident Engineer.
- 3.3. Pay Quantity Collection- Pay documents will be provided and quantity measurements will be checked for accuracy.
- 3.4. Environmental & Erosion Control Monitoring

- i. If a SWPPP is required for the referenced project, the CONSULTANT will provide a certified NPDES inspector, which has at a minimum the WPCM qualification, who will monitor the Contractor's compliance with all permits and storm water plans.
- ii. Consultant will review weekly monitoring reports prepared by the Contractor. Reports will be uploaded to ProjectWise for the LHTAC Resident Engineer's review and approval.
- iii. This scope includes one inspection per week with one additional inspection per month for storm driven events. The scope includes 1 hour per inspection. The scope does not include monthly inspections after the final stabilization measures are in place. Additional inspections will be negotiated as supplemental work.
- 4. <u>Materials Sampling & Testing</u> CONSULTANT will coordinate materials sampling & testing services as required by the Contract and the LHTAC Resident Engineer. The following items represent the major sub-tasks required for administering this portion of the agreement.
 - 4.1. Acceptance sampling & testing for embankment, aggregates, concrete, plant mix, etc. will not be required and will not be performed by CONSULTANT. Acceptance will be based on Contractor Quality Control tests as specified in the MTRs.
 - 4.2. Prepare and Transmit Test Results Review and file contractor testing results. Observed noncompliance will be communicated to the contractor and LHTAC.
 - 4.3. Schedule for Sampling the LHTAC Resident Engineer will be informed of the project sampling and testing schedule and all documentation reports of sampling and testing will be completed and submitted the same week the work is done or as otherwise directed.
 - 4.4. Acceptability of "or-equal" Products CONSULTANT will evaluate and determine the acceptability of substitute, or "or-equal" materials and equipment proposed by the Contractor. Recommendations will be made to the LHTAC Resident Engineer for change orders before allowing any substitutes.

- i. All sampling and testing will be performed by the Contractor.
- ii. No QASP statistical analysis is required and therefore not included in this scope of work.

5. Record Drawings & Project Close-Out — CONSULTANT will review the As-built drawings submitted by the Contractor. At project close-out, all records will be finalized and quantity calculations verified. A final package of records will be submitted to the LHTAC Resident Engineer for review and acceptance within 30 days of project completion date.

Performance Assumptions:

- 5.1. Verify that all necessary documents have been received for submission of contractor's affidavit of payment.
- 5.2. Receive bonds, certificates, or other evidence of insurance not previously submitted and required by the Contract Documents, including certificates of inspection, tests and approvals, shop drawings, samples, and the annotated record documents which are to be assembled by the Contractor in accordance with the Contract Documents to obtain final payment.
- 5.3. Promptly conduct an inspection after notice from the Contractor that the entire work is ready for its intended use, in the company of the SPONSOR, LHTAC Resident Engineer and the Contractor, to determine if the work is Substantially Complete. Develop a punch list for the completion of the work prior to final acceptance or substantial completion where required.
- 5.4. Participate in a final inspection, to include representatives from the SPONSOR and LHTAC, to determine if the completed work by the contractor is acceptable so that the LHTAC may recommend in writing, final payment to the Contractor.
- 5.5. CONSULTANT will review As-built record plans received from the Contractor. CONSULTANT will forward to LHTAC record plans showing appropriate record information based on project annotated documents received and deemed acceptable from the Contractor.
- 5.6. Full and final project documentation in ProjectWise must be completed no later than 30 days after the project work complete date or after final documentation has been submitted by the Contractor.

6. Key Understandings

- 6.1. <u>Project Schedule</u> CONSULTANT proposes to implement its services within the following schedule: The scope of work for this project will run in accordance with the contractor's construction schedule. It is anticipated that CONSULTANT will be engaged in CE&I services for three months beginning between June 5, 2023 and no later than July 24, 2023.
- 6.2. Professional Service Fee CONSULTANT will invoice the LHTAC Resident Engineer for professional services described in this Scope of Work. CONSULTANT will invoice the LHTAC Resident Engineer for professional labor and reimbursable expenses based on the Cost Estimate and will bill only for the efforts actually expensed to complete the project in accordance with the provisions of the ITD Task Order for this work.

The fee estimate, level-of-effort projections, and schedule assumptions represent CONSULTANTS professional judgment. They are presented to allow a review of our approach. As we initiate activities, it may become apparent some modifications to this proposal are necessary due to changes in the Contractor's schedule. CONSULTANT will advise the LHTAC Resident Engineer of such issues

- and any fee and/or schedule impact prior to implementing revised activities.
- 6.3. It is anticipated that each CONSULTANT personnel assigned to the project will be furnished with a vehicle, digital camera and cellular phone by CONSULTANT and all work will be under the supervision of the LHTAC Resident Engineer or his assigned representative.
- 6.4. LHTAC will provide plans and specifications/contracts to the CONSULTANT.
- 6.5. Claims are not included in the project estimate. Should a claim arise, additional compensation will be considered and negotiated in a mutually agreeable manner with CONSULTANT for additional work that may result.



Recommendation

Staff recommends that City Council accept the lowest responsive bid, award the project, and authorize execution of the Contract Agreement between Vortex Services, LLC and the City of Pocatello for the 2025 North Main Extension sewer project in the amount of \$428,995.00, subject to Legal Department review. Funding is available in WPC Department - Capital Outlay – Other Infrastructure 032-3011-500.80-99.

Background

This sanitary sewer project involves repairing degraded sewer main lines using a cured-in-place pipe (CIPP) lining system. This trenchless sewer repair technology minimizes surface repairs resulting from open-trenching methods, reduces maintenance caused by tree root intrusion, and can extend the life of the existing sewer main up to 50 years.

This project includes work designed by Consor Engineers to rehabilitate 500-feet of 24-inch diameter sanitary sewer that crosses the UPRR tracks, North Main St, and North Arthur Ave near the Portneuf River. The project also includes the annual CIPP rehabilitation project, which includes lining 15 sewer main lines at various locations in Pocatello, totaling approximately 4,081 feet. The annual CIPP project was incorporated to reduce construction costs.

The work will start in August 2025 and be completed by end of September 2025. Funding is available in the WPC capital account.

Bids were received for the project on April 1st 2025, with the following results:

Vortex Services, Helena, MT \$428,995 Insituform Technologies, Chesterfield, MO \$462,649 Iron Horse, Fairview, OR \$658,504

Vortex Services was the lowest responsive bid at \$428,995.

THIS AGREEMENT is by and between	City of Pocatello	("OWNER") and
Vortex Services, LLC		("CONTRACTOR").
OWNER and CONTRACTOR hereby agree as	follows:	

ARTICLE 1 – WORK

1.01 CONTRACTOR shall complete all Work as specified or indicated in the Contract Documents. The Work is generally described as follows:

The work consisting of the rehabilitation of 500 LF of existing 24" corrugated metal sewer main piping and . This rehabilitation will utilize Cured-In-Place piping (CIPP) to create a new liner within the existing pipe. This pipe is located beneath North Main Street in Pocatello, Idaho and runs beneath existing Union Pacific Railroad (UPRR) tracks. The rehabilitation work will include pipe and manhole cleaning, sewer bypass pumping, the installation of a pre-liner, and the CIPP construction. Traffic control and coordination with UPRR will be required.

ARTICLE 2 – ENGINEER

- 2.01 The part of the Project that pertains to the Work has been designed by ENGINEER.
- 2.02 The OWNER has retained Consor ("Engineer") to act as OWNER'S representative, assume all duties and responsibilities, and have the rights and authority assigned to ENGINEER in the Contract Documents in connection with the completion of the Work in accordance with the Contract Documents.

ARTICLE 3 – CONTRACT TIMES

- 3.01 Time of the Essence
 - A. All time limits for Milestones, if any, Substantial Completion, and completion and readiness for final payment as stated in the Contract Documents are of the essence of the Contract.
- 3.02 Contract Times: Days
 - The Work will be substantially completed within 120 days after the date when the Contract Times commence to run as provided in Paragraph 4.01 in Section 00 72 00, General Conditions and be completed and ready for final payment in accordance with [Paragraph 15.06 in Section 00 72 00, General Conditions within 150 days after the date when the Contract Times commence to run.]
 - Notice of Award no more than 45 days after Bid Opening Date, and
 - OWNER Signing of Contract and Issuance of Notice to Proceed within thirty (30) days after Notice of Award.

- B. Where the OWNER is prevented from signing of contract and issuing Notice to Proceed due to a delay in receiving signed agreements, bonds and insurance certificates from CONTRACTOR in the form required by the Contract Documents, the Contract Times will not be extended.
- C. Where the CONTRACTOR is prevented from starting to perform the work due to delay in issuance of Notice to Proceed beyond the control of the CONTRACTOR, the Contract Times will be extended in an amount equal to the time lost due to such delay, and such extension of the Contract Times shall be CONTRACTOR'S sole and exclusive remedy for such delay.

3.03 **Liquidated Damages**

- A. CONTRACTOR and OWNER recognize that time is of the essence as stated in Paragraph 3.01 above and that OWNER will suffer financial and other losses if the Work is not completed and Milestones not achieved within the times specified in Paragraph 3.02 above, plus any extensions thereof allowed in accordance with the Contract. The parties also recognize the delays, expense, and difficulties involved in proving in a legal or arbitration proceeding the actual loss suffered by OWNER if the Work is not completed on time. Accordingly, instead of requiring any such proof, OWNER and CONTRACTOR agree that as liquidated damages for delay (but not as a penalty):
 - Substantial Completion: CONTRACTOR shall pay OWNER \$500 for each day that expires after the time (as duly adjusted pursuant to the Contract) specified in Paragraph 3.02.A above for Substantial Completion until the Work is substantially complete.
 - Completion of Remaining Work: After Substantial Completion, if CONTRACTOR shall neglect, refuse, or fail to complete the remaining Work within the Contract Times (as duly adjusted pursuant to the Contract) for completion and readiness for final payment, CONTRACTOR shall pay OWNER \$250 for each day that expires after such time until the Work is completed and ready for final payment.
 - Liquidated damages for failing to timely attain Substantial Completion and final completion are not additive and will not be imposed concurrently.

3.04 Special Damages

- In addition to the amount provided for liquidated damages, CONTRACTOR shall reimburse OWNER (1) for any fines or penalties imposed on OWNER as a direct result of the CONTRACTOR'S failure to attain Substantial Completion according to the Contract Times, and (2) for the actual costs reasonably incurred by OWNER for engineering, construction observation, inspection, and administrative services needed after the time specified in Paragraph 3.02 for Substantial Completion (as duly adjusted pursuant to the Contract), until the Work is substantially complete.
- B. After CONTRACTOR achieves Substantial Completion, if CONTRACTOR shall neglect, refuse, or fail to complete the remaining Work within the Contract Times, CONTRACTOR shall reimburse OWNER for the actual costs reasonably incurred by OWNER for engineering, construction observation, inspection, and administrative services needed after the time specified in Paragraph 3.02 for Work to be completed and ready for final payment (as duly adjusted pursuant to the Contract), until the Work is completed and ready for final payment.
- C. The special damages imposed in this paragraph are supplemental to any liquidated damages for delayed completion established in this Agreement.

- 5.02 Progress Payments; Retainage
 - A. OWNER shall make progress payments on account of the Contract Price on the basis of CONTRACTOR'S Applications for Payment as recommended by ENGINEER monthly during performance of the Work as provided in Paragraph 5.02.A.1 below, provided that such Applications for Payment have been submitted in a timely manner and otherwise meet the requirements of the Contract. All such payments will be measured by the Schedule of Values established as provided in the General Conditions (and in the case of Unit Price Work based on the number of units completed) or, in the event there is no Schedule of Values, as provided elsewhere in the Contract.
- 5.03 Prior to Substantial Completion, progress payments will be made in an amount equal to the percentage indicated below but, in each case, less the aggregate of payments previously made and less such amounts as OWNER may withhold, including but not limited to liquidated damages, in accordance with the Contract

- 7.01 In order to induce OWNER to enter into this Contract, CONTRACTOR makes the following representations:
 - A. CONTRACTOR has examined and carefully studied the Contract Documents, and any data and reference items identified in the Contract Documents.
 - B. CONTRACTOR has visited the Site, conducted a thorough, alert visual examination of the Site and adjacent areas, and become familiar with and is satisfied as to the general, local, and Site conditions that may affect cost, progress, and performance of the Work.
 - C. CONTRACTOR is familiar with and is satisfied as to all Laws and Regulations that may affect cost, progress, and performance of the Work.
 - D. CONTRACTOR has carefully studied all: (1) reports of explorations and tests of subsurface conditions at or adjacent to the Site and all drawings of physical conditions relating to existing surface or subsurface structures at the Site that have been identified in the Supplementary Conditions, especially with respect to Technical Data in such reports and drawings, and (2) reports and drawings relating to Hazardous Environmental Conditions, if any, at or adjacent to the Site that have been identified in the Supplementary Conditions, especially with respect to Technical Data in such reports and drawings.
 - E. 9.02 Assignment of Contract

A. Unless expressly agreed to elsewhere in the Contract, no assignment by a party hereto of any rights under or interests in the Contract will be binding on another party hereto without the written consent of the party sought to be bound; and, specifically but without limitation, money that may become due and money that is due may not be assigned without such consent (except to the extent that the effect of this restriction may be limited by law), and unless specifically stated to the contrary in any written consent to an assignment, no assignment will release or discharge the assignor from any duty or responsibility under the Contract Documents.

9.03 Successors and Assigns

A. OWNER and CONTRACTOR each binds itself, its successors, assigns, and legal representatives to the other party hereto, its successors, assigns, and legal representatives in respect to all covenants, agreements, and obligations contained in the Contract Documents.

9.04 Severability

A. Any provision or part of the Contract Documents held to be void or unenforceable under any Law or Regulation shall be deemed stricken, and all remaining provisions shall continue to be valid and binding upon OWNER and CONTRACTOR, who agree that the Contract Documents shall be reformed to replace such stricken provision or part thereof with a valid and enforceable provision that comes as close as possible to expressing the intention of the stricken provision.

9.05 CONTRACTOR'S Certifications

- A. CONTRACTOR certifies that it has not engaged in corrupt, fraudulent, collusive, or coercive practices in competing for or in executing the Contract. For the purposes of this Paragraph 10.05:
 - "corrupt practice" means the offering, giving, receiving, or soliciting of any thing of value likely to influence the action of a public official in the bidding process or in the Contract execution;
 - "fraudulent practice" means an intentional misrepresentation of facts made (a) to influence the bidding process or the execution of the Contract to the detriment of

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- OWNER, (b) to establish Bid or Contract prices at artificial non-competitive levels, or (c) to deprive OWNER of the benefits of free and open competition;
- "collusive practice" means a scheme or arrangement between two or more BIDDERS, with or without the knowledge of OWNER, a purpose of which is to establish Bid prices at artificial, non-competitive levels; and
- 4. "coercive practice" means harming or threatening to harm, directly or indirectly, persons or their property to influence their participation in the bidding process or affect the execution of the Contract.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF POCATELLO, A MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF IDAHO, REPEALING CHAPTER 5.28 "CHILDCARE" OF THE REVISED AND COMPILED ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF POCATELLO, 1983, AND PROVIDING THAT THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BE IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT FROM AND AFTER ITS PASSAGE, APPROVAL, AND PUBLICATION ACCORDING TO LAW.

WHEREAS, Pocatello Municipal Code Chapter 15.28 "Childcare" was established by the City Council upon passage of City of Pocatello Ordinance No. 2951 on July 16, 2015 and amended thereafter; and

WHEREAS, I.C. §39-1108 grants authority to cities to act as the licensing body for childcare facilities within their jurisdictions; and

WHEREAS, on March 27, 2025, the Governor signed House Bill 243a which, among other actions, repeals Idaho Code §39-1108; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to recently passed legislation, childcare licensing and regulating will be solely a State function beginning July 1, 2025; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has determined that the repeal of said chapter is required in order to remain in compliance with Idaho Code.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF POCATELLO AS FOLLOWS:

<u>Section 1</u>: That Chapter 5.28 "Childcare" of the Revised and Compiled Ordinances of the City of Pocatello, 1983, is hereby repealed in its entirety.

<u>Section 2</u>: That this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval, and publication according to law.
